BEEFHIDES are slow and easier. Several cargoes of South American hides have arrived at United States ports during the past week, which has caused a further decline. City Butcher Hides flat 17c. per lb. Country Hides, flat, cured, 16 to 17c. per lb. Part cured, 15 to 16 1/2c. per lb. Green 14 to 15c.

CALFSKINS are easier, and a further decline would not be surprising. City skins green, flat, 17c. Country cured, 17 to 18c. Part cured, 16 1/2c. according to condition and take off. Deacons or Bob Call 75c. to \$1.00 each.

HORSEHIDES are in good supply with few inquiries. City take off No. 1, \$4 to \$4.50. No. 2, \$2.50 to \$3.50. SHEEPSKINS are strong and are in good demand. City Sheepskins \$1.75 to \$2.50 each. Country Sheepskins 60c. to \$2.00.

WOOL is strong and in good demand. Washed combing fleeces (coarse) 30 to 35c. Washed clothing fleeces (fine) 33 to 37c. Washed rejections, (burry, chaffy, etc.) 25 to 28c. Unwashed fleeces combing (coarse) 22 to 24c. Unwashed fleeces clothing (fine) 25 to 27c.
