Island Odds And Ends

Everywhere in the Province, in town and countryside new buildings are being erected, old buildings enlarged or remodelled. New homes, barns, schoolhouses, business premises are taking form and shape as construction workers take advantage of glorious summer weather. Travel anywhere on the Island and you almost get the impression that a campaign of improvement is underway, with many communities taking part. Perhaps never in Island history have hammer and saw been busier than in this summer of 1950. The total value of all construction activity must be very high and reflects optimism, good times and contentment. Pessimists, and the unhappy, do not build either homes or contentment. They tear down.

Farmers especially will be interested in the farm buildings, now well on their way to completion at the MacKinnon farm in Mermaid. The owner, a Montserratian whose father, Mr. Alex MacKinnon, and mother are native Islanders, has about five hundred acres of land purchased. He will go into the cattle business, both beef and dairy, in a big way. The new barn, with its several wings and extensions is more than 120 feet long and will be modern to the last degree. It's very size, topped by an all-metal roof, catches the eye a long way off. Perhaps it will set a style in P.E.I. for bigger farms, which modern machinery has now made possible in many other parts of the Dominion.

Those who attended the racing at the Charlottetown Driving Park last Friday night got quite a lift out of the way Col. D.A. MacKinnon came home in front with two long-hops. They were quick to see that the Colonel won by making the most of what he had. A good ride spells the margin between first and second more often than not.

War veterans everywhere in the Province, and most especially the pensioners with whom he came into contact frequently, will regret the unexpected passing of Dr. G. Linus Smith of the Department of Veterans Affairs, Charlottetown. His courtesy, patience and efforts to help the veterans who passed through his hands will not be forgotten. Whether the soldier needed hospitalization or treatment for a minor disability, the Doctor was equally considerate. His friendliness was natural and reassuring to many a veteran worried about his physical condition.

Something like a blight has fallen on trout fishing. Since mid-June or thereabouts catches have been few and far between, though the bait fanciers have had some small successes. The gloomy reports come from all quarters, relieved only here and there by success stories. One of the few of the brighter reports concerns Sturgis, where it is said Mr. P. W. Turner of Charlottetown and Rev. Sydney Bonnell of New York landed some nice sea trout. These were taken not at "The Run" near the bridge, but out near the wharf. The anglers stood offshore in a boat and caught their fish on a rising tide.

In the vicinity of the Dunk River Summerside people have been having fun with Rainbow trout and some up to six pounds have been landed. The white strip reappearing on our paved highways, so helpful in after-night driving, has the blessing of all motorists. Paint not only saves the surface, it can also do save lives on our roads; how many no one will ever know.

The North Nova Scotia Highlanders, in which so many Islanders served during the war, will hold a re-union in Charlottetown during Exhibition Week. About three hundred vets of the Regiment from Nova Scotia and Island points are expected to gather for the event. The boys are planning to make it a real marker in the Regiment's post-war history.

Anticipates Russian Peace Campaign

LAKE SUCCESS, N. Y., July 30 (Reuters) - Russia is expected to launch a powerful three-point "peace campaign" to end the Korean war when Soviet delegates return to the United Nations Security Council Tuesday. This is the opinion of some of the most experienced diplomats here including experts from Eastern European countries. They point out that the Soviet Union is at present spear-heading a world-wide campaign around its so-called "peace appeal."

The Russian attitude towards Korea, they add, should be judged in the light of the Kremlin's overall internal and external policy. That is to pose the Soviet Government as the champion of peace against the "warmongers" of Britain and the United States.

WARSAW, Poland, July 30 - (AP) - A Pole who served in the R.A.F. during the war was sentenced to death Saturday by a military court after being convicted of espionage. Former P.L.L. Wladyslaw Sliwinski was accused of working for British military intelligence since he returned to Poland in 1947.

Experts Stumped Over Wasps' Nest

OTTAWA, July 30 - (Special) - Ottawa's top agricultural experts this week-end confessed themselves stumped as to the best way to deal with a wasp's nest on the eaves of a city dwelling. They had several solutions, but were prepared to guarantee none of them and suggested that since early frosts will halt wasp activity in about two months' time, it might be as well to leave the grey bomb-like structure where it is until the cold weather comes.

A city full of Federal Government experts on every conceivable subject Ottawa is supposed to provide solutions to every problem. This week-end when a member of the press gallery here noticed a rapidly-growing wasp's nest on the cornice near the bedroom where two of his young children sleep, he appealed to both the head of the apiary division of the Central Experimental Farm and to the head of the Entomological Division of the Department of Agriculture.

"Why don't you just light an oily ray on the end of a long pole and burn it off?" asked the Dominion apiarist. "No dice," shot back the newspaperman. "The nest is right on the eaves. Do you think I want to burn my house down?" So he looked a little less dangerous but it is only feasible at night. It is to place a tub of boiling water underneath the nest, then knock it down so the water, the wasps will all drown. Only catch with this method is that if the knocking down is not done quickly, the wasps will awake and come after the disturber of their slumbers - with stings at the alert.

Third solution requires a regular bee-hunter's uniform of wide hat with veil, heavy gloves and heavy clothing with both sleeves and trousers-cuffs tightly fastened to wrists and ankles to avoid slings. In this garb, you advance on the nest with a sprayer filled with one of the DDT compounds. After a thorough soaking with insecticide, the nest can easily be knocked down and disposed of with its poisoned brood.

"Isn't there some simpler way to get out of the difficulty?" the newspaperman asked Dominion Entomologist Crawford. "All these things either need special equipment or don't seem very safe for an amateur." "Well," replied the expert, "you know we'll be having frost around September. You could just warn your children to be careful, leave the wasps' nest where it is and let nature take its course with the cold weather."

Result was that the wasps are getting a new lease on life.

U. S. Racing Against Time

WASHINGTON, July 29 - (AP) - The United States Government is racing against time to win the Korean conflict and arm for possible war with Russia - with full knowledge that a continued policy of U. S. showing in one could easily win the other. Will mighty Russia step openly into war? The guess by some highly-placed officials is three years. Others think the time could be less. Russia is watching the U. S. in Korea to see how Americans fight. They are fighting badly now. If the final showing is the same, the Kremlin may not wait three years.

Also, the time estimate could be wrong. The United States was wrong about how Russia could make its first atomic bomb. The U. S. government is reported to be talking now about a \$35,000,000,000 outlay in this fiscal year, which began July 1. That would include money for fighting the current war; for building up against the mounting menace of another! for making the free European powers stronger.

Some top U. S. military thinking is that Russia - until she feels she is ready - will not move where she must commit her own troops. If that is true, it could mean that there might be no early, direct action in some of the "sensitive" spots around the world - Western Germany, in Iran, in Yugoslavia. At those points, she could not rely on her satellites to do her fighting, as she has in Korea.

Asia is a different picture. In that part of the world there are unlimited millions of Communist-indoctrinated Asiatics to do Russia's fighting. Korea demonstrated that.

Protest High Meat Prices in Canada

TORONTO, July 30 - (CP) - A telegram protesting the high cost of meat has been sent to Prime Minister St. Laurent and Finance Minister Abbott by the Housewives' Consumer Federation of Canada. Beef now is offered at 98 cents a pound in some Toronto stores.

Business Spotlight

Once in a while big business in the United States comes under fire.

Many people feel it comes under fire for scarcely any other reason than the fact that it is big. So far as one can see, the attacks on bigness in itself don't come from workers or people in general, whose chief concern seems to be one of getting their share of the profits of production. But there is a considerable political attack which may be a hang-over from the "bad old days" when business was a fair object for curbing.

The attacks across the border have been fairly voluble recently, but Sam Dawson of the Associated Press comments that the shooting war in Korea may soften this outcry. And he adds, "If the shooting spreads elsewhere, we may wish our industries were even bigger than they are."

Before the Korean trouble started, Commerce Secretary Sawyer of the United States asked: "When everything else in America is getting bigger, shall we expect business to get smaller?" And Charles E. Wilson, president of General Electric, commented: "No company and no industry has yet been big enough to bring enough goods to enough people."

It would seem to this writer that the argument is immature and certainly overlooking the developments that have taken place in the present century. At any rate it doesn't enter into the picture to any degree in Canada.

Paris Fashions

By Florence Mills PARIS, July 30 - (AP) - Fur dresses, helmet-shaped hats and mink-soled shoes are among Pierre Balmain's fashion entries for fall.

He has replaced one short skirted 1920 line he offered in the spring with a more shapely silhouette that reaches to mid-calf instead of just below the knee. Most of his hats are helmet type, but he extends to flare out around the nape of the neck. Balmain's fur dresses are slim, with well indented waists and choker necks. One, in black Russian broadtail, is topped with a sleeveless black wool coat slashed up the side seams and up the centre, back and front.

He uses a tremendous amount of fur. Dresses have mink collars and cuffs. Topcoats and some jackets are lined with astrakhan. Mink-soled shoes are worn with hostess trouser suits of black jersey that look exactly like ankle-length "longies."

Topcoats are bulky. But Balmain shows a casual, stone-colored travel coat in Scotch cashmere that, without its fur trimming, weighs only seven ounces and can be pulled through a bracelet. Rare Metal Found Near Washington

WASHINGTON, July 30 - (AP) - Germanium, one of the rarest of metals and a wartime strategic material of utmost importance, has been discovered in the Washington area. However, the scattered nature of the deposits makes profitable recovery extremely doubtful. Nevertheless, experts have tabbed the concentration of the world's second richest known concentration of the rare element. They report deposits here are exceeded only in contents from rocks in Southwest Africa and the Belgian Congo.

During the last war germanium was found to be extremely important, due to unique properties of its crystals. They pass an electric current in one direction only. It was invaluable in detecting ultra-high frequency radio and radar signals.

Give Flower Seed Special Care When Sown in Garden



Mix Seed With Sand, and Scatter Over Area as Evenly as Possible.

All annual flower seeds may be sown directly in the garden; and there are a number which should be, because they are difficult to transplant. These include Alyssum, California poppy, godetia, kochia, leptosyne, linaria, lupin, matthiola, (evening scented stock) nasturtium, dwarf phlox, poppies, portulaca and salpiglossis. Failure with flower seed sown in a garden bed or border is often due to lack of care. Much the same technique should be used as in sowing in a seed box, particularly as to shallow planting, and covering the seeds with porous soil. Identification of the seeds, and of their location are also important since with slow germinators it is easy to forget exactly where they were sown. Care will be well repaid. Seeds are subject to many hazards which human skill cannot wholly avoid, but the careful operator may count upon a high average of success.

Prepare a smooth seed bed, loosening the soil to a depth of six inches. Work into it 4 pounds of plant food for each 100 square feet. Then outline with a string the area to be covered with each variety. Mix the seed with sand to help scatter it over the space as evenly as possible. Then sift a light covering of porous soil over the seed and firm it lightly. Now, until the seeds sprout the soil must be kept moist; and this requires daily sprinkling with a fine spray, taking care not to wash the fine seeds out of the soil. You should know when to expect the seeds to sprout. The table at the end is based upon experience in seed laboratories. In your garden the period may be more or less by a few days, but it will serve as a guide.

Delly, Brodiaea, Calceola, Callipolis, Candytuft, Celosia, Centaurea, Coreopsis, Cosmos, Sweet William, Dianthus California Poppy, Godetia, Leptosyne, Linaria, Lobelia Lupinus, Marigold, Mimulus, Nicotiana, (sweet tobacco); Pansy, Petunia, Annual Phlox, Portulaca, Mignonette, Schizanthus, Viola, Zinnia, Nasturtium.

Ten to Twenty Days: Ageratum, Cobaea Scandens, Coleus, Dahlia, Carnation, Snow-on-the-mountain, Gaillardia, Gerbera, Kochia, Sweet Pea, Forget-me-not, Nigella, Primrose, Cypress Vine, Cardinal Climber, Castor Bean, Scabiosa, Salpiglossis, Verbena.
