P.E.I. Ayrshires Are Tops In Milk And Butter Tests

In the April issue of the "Canadian Ayrshire Review" Island Ayrshires topped the senior four-year-old class and the junior two-year-old class, in the 305 day division, and the junior four-year-old class in the 365 day division. They also stood second in three other classes.

"Columario Geraldine", owned by J. W. Lewis, Freetown, was high cow in the four-year-old class. She produced 11,834 lbs. milk and 554 lbs. butterfat, this being 139 percent and 154 percent for milk and butterfat, respectively, of the breed average.

"Fairvue Marion" and "Fairvue May 2nd", owned by A. MacRae and Sons, Charlottetown, were first in the junior two-year-old class and the junior 305 day division, respectively. "Fairvue Marion" produced 9,821 lbs. milk 439 butterfat, this being 143 and 153 percent of breed average for milk and butterfat, respectively. "Fairvue May 2nd" produced

12,921 lbs. milk, 554 lbs. butterfat to make 148 and 150 percent of the breed average for milk and butterfat, respectively.

"Raeburn Thelma", owned by E. MacRae, New Wiltshire, was second in the junior four-year-old class. "Ch'town, Sir Roderick Connie" was second in the mature class, 305 day division and "Columario Donna" owned by J. W. Lewis, Freetown, was second in the senior four-year-old class, 365 day division.

Cows owned by R. L. Cairns, Freetown, and Almon Wood and Sons, Little York, A. MacRae and Sons, Charlottetown and W. E. Prowse Brackley Point, also stood high in their respective classes.
