Eden Proposes "Colombo Powers" Oversee Indo-China Armistice

GENEVA (Reuters) — Foreign Secretary Eden of Britain formally proposed at the Geneva conference Tuesday that India, Pakistan, Burma, Indonesia and Ceylon — the "Colombo powers" — be responsible for supervising any armistice in Indo-China.

The Russian Foreign Minister, Molotov, affirmed the Communist view that the supervisory commission should include Communist Poland and Czechoslovakia as well as India and Pakistan.

The heads of the United States and French delegations, Walter Bedell Smith and Foreign Minister Bidault, also spoke at Tuesday's session, the first full sitting in three weeks after 12 secret meetings. The session lasted four hours, 50 minutes.

Eden, who flew back to Geneva from London after getting cabinet backing to keep up the negotiations, said the five Asian powers are "admirably qualified" to act as cease-fire supervisors and "meet the essential requirements of impartiality."

IMMEDIATE TASKS

Eden said the conference was faced with three immediate tasks:

1. Need for military representatives of the two opposing commands to submit agreed recommendations to the conference.
2. Reach agreement on the composition and powers of the international supervisory commission.

Previous to the show at 7 o'clock Barardo, using putty in his eyes will be blindfolded by a policeman and will climb a ladder to the roof of the Rollaway and walk around the parapet of the building. While doing this he will hypnotize a boy riding a bicycle on the inside of the parapet.

The 31 year old native of Australia is the man who taught hypnotism to the Great Morton who appeared in this City during last winter. He was born and brought up with the circus which his father owned. Bob Barardo at an early age took his part under the "big top" as a wild animal trainer. In one of the circus acts was a hypnotist and the lad became interested. He later went to college and studied to obtain his degree in Hypno Therapy.

Three times he appeared at Royal Command performances, once at the Palladium in London and twice at Windsor castle. His act has taken him to 34 countries of the world.

The Uncanny Barardo has challenged every hypnotist in the world to match his speed in hypnotizing his subjects but has yet to have anyone exceed his record of one twenty third of a second. Some of the added features are the use of a telepathy on subjects not under a hypnotic spell.
