## IDA BAILEY ALLEN Some Dazzling Ideas For Afternoon Bridge

"Several ladies we have met recently have asked for 'dazzling ideas for bridge refreshments or after-dinner dessert parties. Madame," said the Chef. "What do you suggest?"

"If the refreshments are for an afternoon bridge party for ladies," I replied, "I nominate a fine homemade layer cake, your square layered puffs and fine fresh boxed chocolate-covered candies."

"If any reduces are expected, better include a poached fruit compote for calorie control. They probably won't choose it, but enjoy one of the pastries instead and plan 't' skip dinner."

"Sounds familiar," chuckled the Chef, patting his waistline. "Of course there will also be plenty of hot coffee, or perhaps a frosty limeade made with carbonated water and stirred with sticks of fresh pineapple."

Measurements are level:

**Strawberry Layered Cake:** Calls for puff pastry, fresh strawberries and ice cream.

The puff pastry shells can be purchased from a baker. Before using, wrap in foil, reheat in moderate oven, then cool.

The sauce: Combine 1 pt. of hot, washed fresh strawberries, 1 c. sugar, 1 tsp. cornstarch and 2 tsp. grated lemon rind; stir-cook 5 min. over low heat.

Mix in 2 tsp. butter or margarine and 3 tsp. lemon juice. Set aside to cool.

Add an extra pint whole hulled, washed strawberries.

To assemble: Top puffs with ice cream, then with sauce. Garnish with hulled whole strawberries, rolled in granulated sugar. Makes 8.

**MONDAY DINNER**

Chilled Vegetable Juice  
Lemon Wedges  
Club Steaks  
Chives or Parsley-Butter  
Potato Puffs  
Mashed Summer Squash  
Chocolate Mints  
or Cherry Spice Loaf  
Hot or Iced Coffee Tea-Milk  
Cherry Spice Loaf: Sift together 2 c. presifted cake flour, 2 tsp. double-acting baking pow-

der, ¼ tsp. salt, 1¼ tsp. cinnamon, ¼ tsp. allspice and ¼ tsp. nutmeg.

In bowl blend ½ c. room-soft butter or margarine and ¾ c. milk alternately to blended egg, beating well after each addition. Fold in 10 chopped drained marshmallows and 10 chopped cherries.

Transfer to an oiled 8x8-in. square pan. Bake 50-55 min. in mod. oven, 375 degrees F.

Cool; split into 2 layers. Put together with sweetened whipped cream; garnish of cherries.

Or put together and top with lemon butter icing.

**TRICK OF THE CHEF**

Roll frozen potato puffs in chopped blanched almonds before baking.
