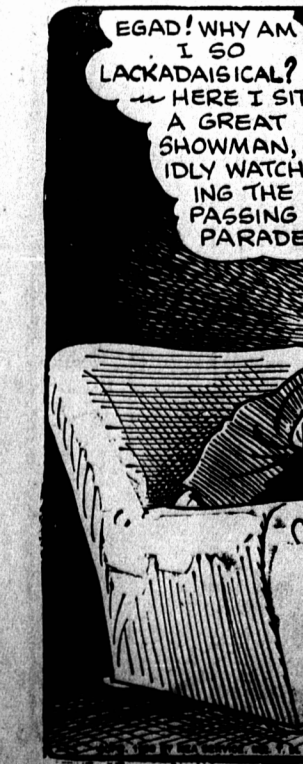

Word has just been received at Summerside of the death within a day of each other in Lawrence, Mass., of two former residents of this Province. On March 30, Ellis Gallant, 80, who was born at Mont Carmel, P. E. I., and lived for 27 years in Summerside before he moved to Lawrence, passed away. He is survived by five sons, one of whom is Glorice, of Summerside, and four daughters. On March 31, John D. Arsenault, 74, died at his home in Lawrence. He was born in Tignish, P. E. I. in 1878 and has lived for many years in Lawrence. He is survived by his wife, the former Marguerite Gaudet of P. E. I., a daughter and four sons, all living in the United States.

OTTAWA, April 4-(Special)-Contract for the construction of a boat harbor at Skinner's Pond as provided in parliamentary estimates this spring is being awarded to the Diamond Construction Company of Fredericton, N. B., it was learned here today.

The Fredericton firm submitted the lowest tender of \$96,000, which was some \$2,000 less than the second lowest offer to do the work.

J. Watson MacNaught, M. P. for Prince and parliamentary assistant to Fisheries Minister Mayhew, who persuaded the government to initiate the Skinner's Pond project, told the Guardian today that work to be done this year would be excavation of a "run" from the pond to open water, construction of retaining walls on either side of the run, and the building of two "outer blocks" to protect the harbor from ice and storm conditions.

Dredging of the inner lagoon will be done by contract which will be awarded in 1951. Estimate of the Works Department for this year's work is \$110,000 so it is expected that a surplus will be left over at the end of the current season. Actual work on the job will start within a few weeks' time, Mr. MacNaught said.

As is customary on Federal Government contracts, local labor will be employed on the project with the exception of a few key posts. Workers will be protected by the fair-wage clause which sets forth that wages to be paid are to be comparable to those paid for similar work in the district.

Mr. MacNaught further announced that he had received details as to size and materials to be used for the new wharf at Brooks Shore, Prince County. The wharf is to be built at the end of the public road at an estimated cost of \$5,500.

It will be 125 feet in length with an approach 16 feet in width and a head block 30 feet by 30. Substructure will be of concrete pile and superstructure of untreated four-inch planking. Plans for the wharf are currently being prepared at Charlottetown and tenders will be called for within the next few weeks.

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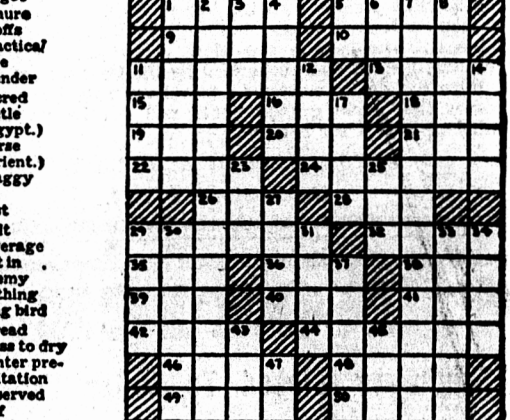
