Greater Effort is Suggested To Attract Economic Freedom

VANCOUVER (CP) - Calls for greater efforts by government to attract foreign capital but "rather find ways of getting by with less."

"To achieve this, every available source of Canadian savings must be tapped and a favourable must be maintained to direct these savings into productive investment."

Canadians should make no mistake about the size of the undertaking if they decide on a "bootstraps" operation, he said. "Foreigners, particularly Americans, had financed more than 75 per cent of Canada's gross capital formation since the Second World War."

In order for Canadians to achieve even 25 per cent ownership of all foreign-controlled companies in Canada, they would have to put up between \$2,000,000,000 and \$3,000,000,000. Such a "buy-out" program could only be effectively achieved over a long period, he said. In the long run, Canada should be able to "look after its own capital requirements and achieve a standard of living comparable to that of the U.S."

Mr. Robertson said Canada was in the "ridiculous position of literally having to borrow to pay interest and dividends on existing U.S. investment."

Canada always had needed foreign capital and Canadians had benefited through a high standard of living.

He said the fact that "new" characterized by long production runs and low unit costs we need to somehow rationalize or regroup our industrial endeavors if we are to grow or prosper."

The second speaker, George Creteanu of Montreal, vice-president of Greenfield Incorporated, an investment firm, said Canada's main concern should be the disinvestment of ages of annexation and few of the advantages of integration."

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
