Unpublished Whelan Letter Comes To Light

A hitherto unpublished letter of Hon. Edward Whelan, one of Prince Edward Island's Confederation Fathers, is reproduced below through the courtesy of Mr. Justice L. P. D. Tilley, of Saint John, son of Sir Leonard Tilley by whom the letter was received on September 1, 1935—just one year after the Charlottetown Conference.

The letter, which is dated at Charlottetown, August 30, 1865, reads as follows:

"My Dear Sir:—
I received a note from the Hon. Mr. Gillmore, your successor in the Secretary's Office, a few days ago, in which he informed me, after an examination of the minutes of the Executive Council by their Clerk, no trace could be found of any order having been given me to furnish to the Government of New Brunswick 250 copies of my little Book on the Confederation Conference. He asked me to furnish him with any letter or order in which I had received the subject. In reply enclosed to him your telegraphic message, ordering 250 copies, which number I had prepared and forwarded to the Secretary's office. I am, however, not regarding as null on account of the great and unexpected change in the character of the Government of your Province, the order which I have written to ask if you will do me the kindness to write a line to Mr. Gillmore, confirming the truth of my statement, so that I may be able to send him a small set of the book. I am completely stunned at your defeat; but we hope your exclusion from the Government is not of any long duration.

A NOTED BOOK

The book to which Mr. Whelan refers in the above letter was subsequently enlarged to include a description of all the Confederation conferences and was published under the title "The Union of the British Empire" by the late Sir Leonard Tilley. It was reprinted a few years ago under the able editorship of Dr. D. C. Harvey, an ardent and able historian of Nova Scotia, himself a Prince of the Confederation. It is now being published in a new edition as representative of the Historic Sites and Monuments Board of Canada.

At the time Mr. Whelan wrote to Sir Leonard Tilley the Ministry of which the latter was a member had just been defeated on the issue of Confederation, but it was returned to power in the following year. Subsequently Sir Leonard became Minister of Customs in the first cabinet of the Dominion of Canada, a portfolio which he retained until 1873, when he became Minister of Finance in the Macdonald Government. After a tenure of office as Lieutenant Governor of New Brunswick he became Finance Minister in the second cabinet of the Dominion. It fell to him to inaugurate the National Policy. Failing health compelled him to resign his portfolio in 1885, and he was then appointed Lieutenant Governor of a native province for the second time.

Included among the private letters of Sir Leonard Tilley are many addressed to Hon. Messrs. Alexander MacRae and other Island statesmen setting forth the advantages of Confederation and the terms which the Federal Government was prepared to offer. These were written at the request of Sir John Macdonald who well knew the value of the respect and confidence in which Sir Leonard was held in this Province.

Salvage Corps Car Attracts Much Interest

Conspicuous in the Firemen's parade yesterday was the splendidly equipped Salvage Corps motor car of the Moncton Fire Department, the only one of its kind in Canada, which was brought here through the courtesy of Mayor McMonagle and Alderman F. M. Brown, chairman of the Fire Committee of the Moncton City Council.

Designed by Fireman G. Foster Keith, treasurer of the Corps, the Salvage Corps car is completely equipped with individual firemen's waterproof coats, boots, and hats as well as ladders, ropes, first aid and other emergency requirements. The men can don their equipment while speeding to a fire and the time saved by this means is often of great importance.

The members of the Salvage Corps are attending the Charlottetown celebration, and are preparing to give a good account of themselves in today's tournament. The Corps holds several tournament championships, including first prize at Truro, Fredericton, Moncton and Amherst.

Foreman of the Corps is Carl Wood, a veteran who joined the 105th Battalion at Whitley Camp as Sergeant machine gun instructor and on the breakup of that unit accompanied the Prince Edward Island boys to France with the Nova Scotia Highlanders. He served three and a half years in France. In the original Nova Scotia battalion he was enlisted, and in the same company, was Captain Angus L. Macdonald who is now Premier of Nova Scotia. A brother of Premier Macdonald's was killed alongside Mr. Wood's line on August 8, 1917.

In addition to the Salvage Corps, Moncton is represented at this week's celebration by twenty-five members of the Fire Department, and a contingent being under the command of Lieutenant Paul Colpitts.

With the Moncton boys on parade yesterday was Patrick Campbell, son of Hon. John M. Johnston, one of the Confederation Fathers. A veteran in years, Mr. Johnston retains the vim and vigour of his youth, and is like a twenty-year-old in the turnout.

Quick Air Service For Business People

MONTREAL, July 18—Businessmen of cities in the Maritime Provinces find the advantage of a new service to Toronto and Western Canada when the new Montreal-Ottawa-Toronto service of Trans-Canada Air Lines went into effect today. The first Montreal-Toronto plane left from Charlottetown at 8 A.M. EST carrying a heavy load of mail from the Maritimes. This was brought to Montreal by the Ocean Limited, which made a special stop at StHubert at 7:34 A.M. to drop the mail.

Passengers on the inaugural trip included Mrs. Adams of London, England, and Mrs. S. McCreey of Vancouver, who is returning to her home after an extensive trip through Europe. Both Mrs. Adams and Mrs. McCreey will leave by TCA planes from Toronto tonight for the Pacific Coast.

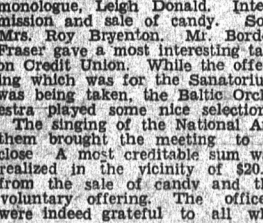
