NEW SYMBOL UNVEILED

Three Major Productions Highlight 'Festival 66'

Details of the 1966 Charlottetown Summer Festival, billed as "the only all-Canadian Festival", were announced yesterday afternoon in Toronto by Artistic Director Mavor Moore and co-directors Johnny Wayne and Frank Shuster.

A restaging of last year's hit musical "Anne of Green Gables", the first stage presentation of Mr. Moore's play "The Ottawa Man", and the world premiere of a brand new Canadian musical comedy "The Adventures of Private Turvey", will highlight the second season of the east coast "Festival of music and laughter".

During a press conference which featured a direct line telephone hook-up with a similar press gathering in Charlottetown, Mr. Moore also said an enlarged pit orchestra would be added this year. The orchestra will also be featured with guest artists at Sunday night concerts throughout the festival. Musical Director is John Fenwick, regular conductor of the Halifax Symphony.

The three major productions will run in repertory after their premiere performances. Rehearsals will begin in mid-June in Charlottetown. The festival will open July 4 and close Sept. 3, a nine-week run. In Charlottetown, Fathers of Confederation Trust president Dr. Frank MacKinnon unveiled and formally adopted a new festival symbol, the work of commercial artist Jeff Radcliffe of Dartmouth, Nova Scotia. He also announced that a contest would be held among the school children of Prince Edward Island to find a suitable name for the new symbol.

The symbol is a cheerful rendering of a bearded gentleman in top hat, representative of the mood that characterized the deliberations of the Founding Fathers during their Charlottetown meeting of 1864, a tradition perpetuated by the hospitality of Prince Edward Islanders and incorporated into the "festival of music and laughter" theme of the Charlottetown Festival.

The 1966 festival will open July 4 with a benefit premiere of "Anne of Green Gables", the critical and popular success of last season when it sold out every one of its 17 performances. Back to recreate their original roles will be most of last year's cast including lead performers Barbara Hamilton, Peter Mews, Dean Regan. Negotiations are not yet complete with other cast members. Twenty-five performances of the musical are scheduled and extra matinees may be added.

Mavor Moore will direct "The Ottawa Man", his own adaptation of Gogol's "The Inspector General". The classic comedy has been given a western Canadian setting in this version which Moore originally created for television and radio several years ago. Donald Harron has been cast as one of the leads in the production, but negotiations are still underway for the role of the mayor, the other principal part.

"The Adventures of Private Turvey" will be given a world premiere July 25 with Jack Duffy in the title role. The musical should be a natural for Duffy, whose comic talents amply fit the "everything happens-to-me-no-matter-what-I-do" character created by humorist Earle Birney in the hilarious spoof of World War II Army life. The musical has been created by Norman Campbell and Donald Harron, who were also responsible for "Anne of Green Gables". Turvey will be staged

and choreographed by Alan Lund who will also perform repeat chorus with "Anne". Supporting roles in all three productions will be filled from the repertory system of star billing in one production and a minor role in another. In announcing the details Mr. Moore emphasized his delight at being able to stage a festival wholly directed towards Canadian writers and performers utilizing Canadian themes.

"I don't think this is being narrow or nationalistic at all," he said, "but rather a very valid premise."

"Charlottetown was responsible for the beginnings of a Canadian motion picture industry 100 years ago, and we are trying to build something unique in Canadian theatrical circles. If you like, we are proving the point that you can stage a successful festival in critical, artistic and popular terms without going outside this country for the human and artistic resources. Last season the festival played to 40,000 people in the 1,000-seat Confederation Centre theatre and another 51,000 visited the Art Gallery which stage a special summer program. This year Mr. Moore is looking for an increase of 10,000 in theatre attendance.

An expanded publicity campaign throughout Canada and the Eastern United States will be launched to acquaint potential summer visitors with the festival and its attractions. About 400,000 tourists are expected to visit Prince Edward Island this summer and the bulk of festival audiences are drawn from this group.

HIGH ESTIMATE — Preliminary cumulative landing statistics indicate that the 1965 landings of fish were the highest ever recorded in the Maritime Provinces. During 1965 fishermen in the Maritimes landed 928,000,000 pounds of fish valued at \$65,700,000, surpassing the 1964 record of 811,000,000 pounds valued at \$58,800,000 by 117,000,000 pounds and \$8,900,000.

This 1965 record catch was composed of 485,000,000 pounds of groundfish valued at \$32,500,000, 383,000,000 pounds of pelagic and estuarial fish valued at \$20,200,000 million dollars and 60,000,000 pounds of molluscs and crustaceans valued at \$3,000,000 million dollars. The 1965 groundfish landings exceeded the average 1962 to 1964 annual landings by 73,000,000 pounds and \$4,800,000 while landings of pelagic fish were 128,000,000 pounds and \$2,200,000 above average. The 1965 shellfish landings were 1,700,000 pounds and \$8,800,000 dollars above the 1962 to 1964 average.

COMMISSION SECOND TERM IS UNLIKELY — Ottawa — Princes Edward Islands representative of the national capital commission is not expected to be re-appointed when her term expires February 6.

1965 Maritimes Fish Catch Said Highest Ever Recorded

HALIFAX — Total fish landings in the Maritimes during December, 1965 amounted to 47,300,000 pounds valued at \$7,800,000.

These totals included 30,600,000 pounds of groundfish valued at \$1,500,000, 9,100,000 pounds of pelagic and estuarial species valued at \$365,000 and 7,600,000 pounds of shellfish valued at \$5,900,000.

In comparison with the average December catch during the years 1962 to 1964, the month's catch was above average by 10,500,000 pounds and \$2,700,000.

Groundfish landings for December were above the average December catch during the years 1962 to 1964 by 8,700,000 pounds and \$668,000. The month's pelagic catch was above the three year December average by 1,100,000 pounds and \$251,000. Shellfish landings for December were 686,000 pounds and \$1,900,000 above the December 1962 to 1964 average.

The increased groundfish catch during December was due to the larger than normal landings of cod, haddock and flatfishes. The larger pelagic landings for December, compared with the previous three years, were the result of higher than average landings of herring, smelts and swordfish. The scallop fishery accounted for the increased shellfish landings for December, compared with the 1962 to 1964 average. Lobsters accounted for the increased value of shellfish, reflecting the high prices paid to fishermen for this species during the month.

HIGHEST EVER — Preliminary cumulative landing statistics indicate that the 1965 landings of fish were the highest ever recorded in the Maritime Provinces. During 1965 fishermen in the Maritimes landed 928,000,000 pounds of fish valued at \$65,700,000, surpassing the 1964 record of 811,000,000 pounds valued at \$58,800,000 by 117,000,000 pounds and \$8,900,000.

This 1965 record catch was composed of 485,000,000 pounds of groundfish valued at \$32,500,000, 383,000,000 pounds of pelagic and estuarial fish valued at \$20,200,000 million dollars and 60,000,000 pounds of molluscs and crustaceans valued at \$3,000,000 million dollars. The 1965 groundfish landings exceeded the average 1962 to 1964 annual landings by 73,000,000 pounds and \$4,800,000 while landings of pelagic fish were 128,000,000 pounds and \$2,200,000 above average. The 1965 shellfish landings were 1,700,000 pounds and \$8,800,000 dollars above the 1962 to 1964 average.

COMMISSION SECOND TERM IS UNLIKELY — Ottawa — Princes Edward Islands representative of the national capital commission is not expected to be re-appointed when her term expires February 6.

Mrs. Ireta Sutherland of Charlottetown was named to the commission early in 1963 by the former Diefenbaker government. The Conservatives lost to the Liberals in the spring election of that year.

Eight members of the 20-member commission were given three year appointments at that time and all of their terms end early in February. The rules provide that no member may serve more than two consecutive three-year terms.

Mrs. Sutherland has been prominent in the ranks of the Conservative party and holds an executive position in the National Women's Progressive Conservative Association.

The commission is in charge of developing and maintaining the large national capital district in the Ottawa-Hull area. Members do not receive any salary but are paid expenses for travelling to Ottawa to attend quarterly meetings.
