CITY COUNCIL MEETING.

Councillor Whear's Important Resolution—Lights Wanted.

Councillor Tanton presided at last night's meeting of the City Council, and Councillor Balls was the only absentee.

After routine business Councillors Taylor, Lyons and Whear gave notice that at the next meeting of the Board they would make application for electric lights, the lamps to be placed on Pownall, Prince and Weymouth Streets.

The tender of Mr. Charles Hermans for plumbing City Hall was accepted, it being the lowest. The amount of the tender is \$495.

Councillor Whear gave notice that at the next meeting of the Board he would introduce a resolution asking for a plebiscite at the approaching election for Water Commissioners to ascertain the views of the people regarding municipal ownership of electric light plant, the abolition of the ward system and the adoption of the cumulative vote, and the bringing on of the election for Water Commissioners at the same time as the election for Mayor and Councillors.

After considerable discussion regarding the removal of snow from the sidewalks the meeting adjourned.

Mr. Peters is to be congratulated on his brave deed, and in his escape from being shot. He has the right stuff in him. As a rescuer from highwaymen he is a success, and we are proud of him.

THE Paris correspondent of the London Daily Mail telegraphs that in an interview with Gen. Mercier, referring to his sensational speech in the senate regarding the invasion of England, he said he had treated the subject from a theoretical and historical standpoint. He did not believe that war with England was imminent or desirable. He hoped that such a war would never occur. In conclusion General Mercier said:—"My wife is an English woman, and my personal feeling toward England is most friendly." Mercier was evidently talking for effect,—perhaps to stimulate the Boers.

Mr. Goldwin Smith, in the Toronto Weekly Sun, writes:—"The Legislature of Victoria has thrown out woman suffrage by a large majority, unconvinced, it seems, by the result of the New Zealand experiment. Twenty-five thousand women, we are told, signed a petition against the measure. These women, it may be presumed, do not wish their sex to be disparaged; on the other hand they do not wish it to be unsexed. They feel that no disparagement is implied in division of spheres between the sexes. Whose heart does not shrink involuntarily from a platform woman? However, the truth is that if the platform Eve should ever get hold of the coveted apple of political power and stump glory, it would probably crumble to ashes in her grasp. To carry on elective government with manhood suffrage is difficult enough; the difficulty is daily becoming greater and breeding more anxious speculation as to the political future. Add to manhood suffrage woman suffrage with its whole tide of emotion restrained by comparatively little responsibility, and the end will pretty surely come. This fact has already dawned upon the minds of some of the more farsighted of the sex.

—Mr. John McEachern has our thanks for the calendar of the Royal Insurance Company for 1901. Surmounting the tables of figures for the various months is a representation of Britannia surrounded by lions representing Great Britain, Australia, Canada and South Africa, while near by is the significant motto, "We hold thee safe." The calendar of Driscoll & Hornsby has also been placed on our table. It is not so large as the Royal, but it is very pretty.

—Hon. A. S. Hardy, ex-premier of Ontario, was a few days ago presented by friends and admirers with a handsome testimonial. The presentation was made by Senator Cox, and consisted of a cheque for twelve thousand dollars, a magnificent oak cabinet containing a solid silver tea service of one hundred pieces and a case of silver cutlery, each inscribed with the provincial coat of arms and the Hardy family crest. The tea service is a facsimile of that used in the Queen's household.

—From all parts of Prince County we hear very encouraging news of the campaign. The political meetings are very strongly in favor of the Conservatives, who are making a grand fight all around. Their presentation of the case against the government is most convincing, and the Liberal nominees find it an exceedingly difficult task to defend the high handed actions, extravagance and mismanagement of the Farquharson combination. Every district is giving a good account of itself, and the prospects, not only in Prince County, but all over the Province, are very bright for the overthrow of the government, even with all the resources and sinews of war it has behind it. The people are becoming tired of the Farquharson clique, and think it is time for a change, and in this they are right.—Summerside Journal.
