LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

NEW CHURCH.—A new Methodist church is to be built at Shelburne. The contract has been let for \$2,500.

To-morrow—Special meetings will be held by the Salvation Army at Watson, led by Adjutant Stanton and Capt. Harrison, of Toronto.

Fire.—Fireworks are again operating near Sakville, N. B. A few nights ago a loading house at Wood Point was destroyed by fire.

TRIAL TRIP.—Captain McMillan's new steamer, the Elliott, will make her trial trip this afternoon, leaving the wharf about three o'clock.

A VALUABLE BRICK.—A brick of gold, the product of the Country Harbor gold mine, Nova Scotia, valued at over \$1,000, was on exhibition in St. John a few days ago.

THE LIFE OF CHRIST.—Lime-light dissolving views, illustrating the life of Christ, will be given on Monday night in the Salvation Army Hall. Admission ten cents.

THE ROAD COMPLETION.—It is announced that teams will be running on a few days from Sydney right through to Glace Bay, the new road being completed from Bridgeport to the latter place.

GESE SHIPMENTS.—A carload of live geese passed through Moncton on Tuesday evening. They were shipped from P. E. Island, and were consigned to Lux & Green, of Melrose, Mass.

A LIVELY TOY.—A Houston, Me., contractor paid over \$200 into the police court of that town one morning recently, to liberate several of his employees who had partaken of the ardent night before.

FASHIONABLE.—The steamer Fastnet left Halifax yesterday morning and arrived here today about eleven o'clock, bringing a full cargo. She will leave for Summerside this evening and will return on Monday, leaving here for Halifax same evening.

CRUELTY TO ANIMALS.—A report of a case of cruelty comes from Bridgewater, N. S. A man is charged with locking into a barn, taking out a horse and tying him to a tree in the woods, where it remained in such a position that it could not get down.

TOOK CHURCH BY MISTAKE.—The coroner's jury declares Prof. Tyndall died from an overdose of chloral taken by mistake. Mrs. Tyndall testified that she administered the chloral through mixing of bottles, and when the Professor discovered this she said, "You have killed your John."

HE GOT DAMAGES.—David Rice, of Chelsea, a huckster on the Gaiterway Valley Railway, was crossing the track at Farnellton, Quebec, last summer, when his foot caught in a frog and a train cut both legs off below the knee. He sued for \$10,000 damages, and the jury awarded him \$2,500.

It is so far known that both of the North Atlantic steamers are to be laid off for the winter and their places filled by the Bonnaville of the Black Diamond line that has been chartered for the purpose.—Halifax Herald.

SHIPPING ORDNANCE COMPETITION.

The Island Team Wins the "A" Shift and Second Prize in the "B" Shift.

The result of the shipping ordinance competition at Halifax, in August last, appears in the Militia Gazette at hand this morning. It is pleasing to observe that the Island team were awarded full points in every case. Six teams took part in the "A" shift. The shift had to be performed within fifteen minutes, the team making the most points securing first prize. No. 1 detachment, No. 1 Co., Halifax; No. 2 detachment, No. 3 Co., Halifax; and No. 1 detachment, Montreal, were disqualified, being over time. The second prize of \$30 in the "A" shift was taken by No. 1 detachment, No. 4 Co., Halifax, and the third prize of \$15 was captured by No. 1 detachment, No. 3 Co., Halifax. No. 1 Co., Halifax, as was stated at the time of the competition, took first prize of \$40 in the "B" shift, and No. 3 detachment, Halifax, third prize of \$15.

The Island team labored under great disadvantages in this competition. They "slipped" on a ground that was very different from that which they practiced on, and with a gun that was ten hundred pounds heavier than the one they had been using at practice. They also made the "A" shift in a rain-fall, which tended to make the ground slippery. But notwithstanding these disadvantages, the "Island boys" gave a most excellent account of themselves in the competition, and when the returns for the 10-inch gun drill are published it will be seen that they also did good work in that competition.

We most heartily congratulate Lieut. Dover and the men composing the Island team upon the splendid showing they have made, and hope to hear from them again next year.

P. E. I. CLERICAL ASSOCIATION.

The twenty-third quarterly meeting of the above Association was held at the Rectory, St. John, on Wednesday last at 10 a. m.

The meeting was presided by a service held in Milton church on the previous evening, when addresses were delivered by the Rev. J. Forbes, H. Harper, T. Lloyd and T. B. Reagh. At the morning session, Rev. W. Hamlyn reported that, in accordance with a resolution passed at a previous meeting, a letter signed by the President (Rev. J. Simpson) and himself, had been forwarded to the S. P. G. of London, England, urging the claims of the P. E. I. country parishes, and deprecating the withdrawal or reduction for the present of the annual grant made by the Society. On the motion of Rev. T. B. Reagh, it was resolved that in future the December meeting of the Association should be held if possible, in a town parish, on account of the possible inclemency of the weather at that season of the year. Rev. W. Hamlyn invited the Association to meet at St. Paul's rectory in February next. The portion of Scripture discussed was St. John XIII. 12-19 to end. The discomfit of travelling on so stormy a day was amply compensated for by the kind hospitality extended towards their guests by Mr. and Mrs. Reagh, who did all in their power to secure the comfort of the visiting clergy, their kindness being fully appreciated by all present.

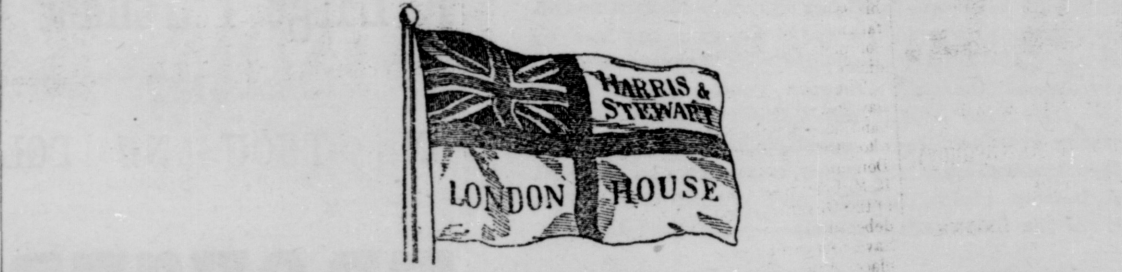
