A NEW lighthouse is to be erected at Savage Harbor, King's County, Prince Edward Island. BURREL-JOHNSTON & CO., of Yarmouth, N. S., are now manufacturing steam fire engines. The hoodlums of the city, after about a week's quiet, are again to the front. Police, attention!! A REPORT of the semi-annual shooting match by Capt. Longworth's Company will appear to-morrow. Garrett vs. Squarebridge and another, a motion to dissolve an injunction granted to prevent the construction of a breakwater opposite the complainant's property, at Stanley Bridge, was also argued and judgment was reserved. SHIPPING at ALBERTON.—B. Rogers & Co's. schr. "M. A. Brewer," has lately been overhauled and refitted with a view to making her more suitable for the coasting trade. Her first trip this season will be to Newfoundland with produce. M. Foley expects to have the briggs "Nyanza" and "Katie" here shortly to load with oats; also the schr. "Maggie." The former brings part of a cargo of salt.—Pat. SHIPPING has now commenced, and a number of schooners have already cleared, but, owing to the heavy ice which blocks the bay, none have as yet sailed. Seven schooners are in the harbor loaded with produce, chiefly for the Newfoundland market. They will sail on the first opportunity. Their cargoes of produce consist of 15,750 bushels of potatoes, 2,260 bushels of oats, 300 bushels of turnips, 45 sheep, and sundry other articles of produce too numerous to mention. THE PRICE-BIGMAY CASE.—The spring term of the Supreme Court of Quebec met on the 28th ult., and the Grand Jury presented a "true bill" against Thomas Cairns Price for bigamy. The prisoner was arraigned and charged with having unlawfully married at Quebec on the 25th of October, 1879, Miss Elizabeth Augusta Frazer, his first wife, Margaret Hewat, whom he married at Summerside, P. E. I., on 23rd of March, 1875, being still living. The prisoner pleaded "Not guilty," and his trial was fixed for Thursday. The Court adjourned at 3.20 p. m. A DOMINION Agricultural and Industrial Exhibition will be held at Montreal this year, commencing on the 13th of September and remaining open for two weeks. It is to be under the patronage of His Excellency the Governor-General and H. R. H. the Princess Louise. Nearly \$25,000 are to be given in prizes. The exhibition of live stock, which is to be held during the second week, is expected to be the largest and best ever seen in the Dominion. The committee have published a circular requesting those who intend to exhibit to mail a postal card addressed to S. C. Stevenson, Secy Council of Arts and Manufactures, Montreal, stating if possible the amount of space (wall or floor) they will require. LINDLEY OPERA Co.—Saturday evening being devoted to the delectation of the people, witnessed the production of "Buffalo Bill," with its accessories of bowie knives, red fire, powder and sensationalism. That the dramatic pabulum was highly relished and well seasoned was evident by the enthusiastic cheers which greeted the terrific struggles and terrible combats, and the roars of laughter which greeted every utterance of that eccentric Lindleyism.—"I'm a bad nigger, and carry a razor. The dramatic persona were excellent throughout. To-night will be the presentation of another novelty, viz.: "H. M. S. Spitfire. NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

EUROPEAN. BERLIN, April 30. The Governor-General of Crete has been hastily summoned to his post, in consequence of excitement on the Island. ST. PETERSBURG, April 30. An important Revolutionist named Sashkoff, who robbed the Treasury of Kherson, last summer, has been arrested. A large number of Nihilists have left Russia. ROME, April 30. In the Chamber of Deputies, yesterday, on the vote of want of confidence in the Ministry, the latter were defeated, 176 to 153. At the Cabinet Council, after a prolonged meeting, it was decided that Ministers should place their resignations in the hands of the King. Premier Cairoli has gone to the Quirinal for that purpose. BERLIN, April 29. The Prussian Court is in regular daily receipt of news in regard to the health of three distinguished invalids at present engrossing attention of all Russia. The first is the Empress, who is kept alive by the use of oxygen and ether, and who, when she is not slumbering, is continually saying to those around her, "How happy must be the people who enjoy good health." Her frame has been reduced to a skeleton. The second illustrious invalid is Prince Gortschakoff, the first cause of whose illness was an attack of indigestion. After him, in relative gravity of the case, comes the Emperor. It is on him that the attention of the German Court is specially concentrated. CONSTANTINOPLE, April 29. The Porte declines all responsibility for Montenegrin trouble. It declares that Turkish authorities strictly conformed to the Convention, and declines to reoccupy the positions taken by the Albanians. 2,000 men and some war material were despatched to Scutari. GREAT BRITAIN. DUBLIN, APRIL 28. The Departure of the Duke and Duchess of Marlborough to-day from Dublin Castle was an imposing spectacle. The weather was brilliant—the finest thus far during the season. Apparently the whole city, together with a considerable delegation from surrounding towns were present. The crowd, at the time the Lord Lieutenant, accompanied by the Duchess, passed through the streets en route for Kingstown, where they were to take the steamer for Liverpool, was immense, and volleys of good wishes came from the multitudes. At this grand, and to them seemingly unexpected expression of affection and respect, the Duke and Duchess were profoundly affected. On their arrival at Kingstown they embarked on the steamer Connaught which was in waiting. As they stood on the deck of the steamer waving their farewells to Ireland, a salute was fired from the peer-heads, which were thronged with people, all joining heartily in the ovation. The enthusiasm is almost without precedent in the history of greeting given by Irish people to any ruler, and demonstrated how fully the retiring Vice-Roy and his wife had won their confidence. Great crowds remained on the pier gazing after the Connaught until she was lost to sight. A public land meeting was held in the Rotunda in Dublin last night. Parnell presided. The proceedings were disorderly and some personal encounters occurred. Sir A. D. Haytler has been appointed Junior Lord of the Treasury, and Lord Kensington Comptroller of the Household. The Catholic Archbishop of Dublin in a pastoral just issued says, "doctrines destructive of mutual confidence are laid down by some public speakers as the first principles of morals. Patriotism is marked as a spirit of disunion between priests and people. The evil genius of Communism which brought such fearful wars on other lands is only watching an opportunity which that disunion may give it, to try and establish its hideous throne among us. Our people have many wrongs, our educational system is imperfect, our land laws though reformed can still be employed as instruments of great injustice, and we must use every means on which God's blessing can be invoked to redress these wrongs."

UNITED STATES. INDIANAPOLIS, April 30. The National Butter, Egg and Cheese Convention adopted a resolution that trade relations be stopped with all commission houses selling oleomargarine. NEW YORK, April 30. A man supposed to be Andrew Jackson, of St. John, N. B., was found drowned here to-day. A Conference of the Reform Republicans held here to-day, declared against Grant or Blaine for the Presidency, and decided to send delegates to the Anti-Third Term Convention, to be held at St. Louis. CAMP SHERIDAN, Nrv., April 29. Last night two desperadoes, named Hall and Porter, while drunk, entered an Indian camp and raised a quarrel with the inmates, shooting and almost killing "Grey Eyes," the big medicine man among the Sioux, and wounded his squaw. The desperadoes were turned over to the civil authorities, and were placed in the guard house heavily ironed, chained and guarded.

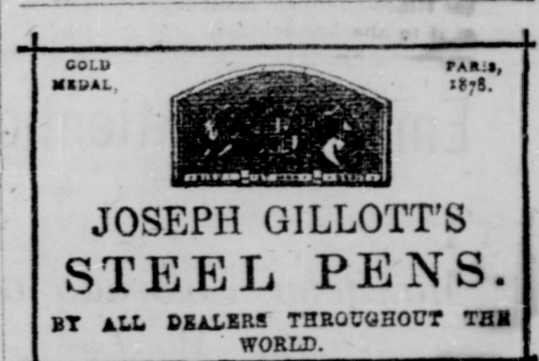
