OTTAWA (CP) — Savings on deposit in C a n a d a's chartered banks at April 30 last amounted to \$5,919,000,000 against \$5,791,000,000 at March 31, and \$5,516,000,000 at April 3, 1955, the chartered bank statement for April showed Thursday.

Call and short term loans in Canada amounted to \$219,000,000 in April, against \$237,000,000 at March 31 and \$230,000,000 at April 3, 1955.
