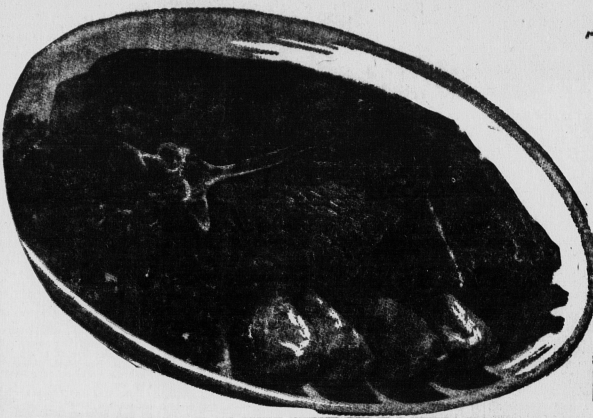

Russians Silent On Goods For Export Here

MOSCOW (CP)—A group of Canadian businessmen tried unsuccessfully here to pin down Soviet trade authorities on what Soviet goods they feel might find a place in the Canadian market.

Five leaders of a 124-man visiting group from the Toronto Board of Trade conferred with Mikhail Nesterov, president of the Russian Chamber of Commerce, and the Soviet chamber officers.

The Canadians asked the Russians what Soviet products they consider could be sold in Canada. Soviet spokesman often contended trade between Canada and the Soviet Union should be more evenly balanced. Until now the balance has been overwhelmingly in Canada's favor.

Sources said the Russian Chamber of Commerce officials failed to offer specific suggestions as to what additional Soviet goods Canada might buy. Nor did they respond to a Canadian suggestion Russia send trade representatives to Canada with samples of products available for export.

Tass news agency said one of the "salient points" of the meeting was the possibility of trade between Canada's West Coast and the Soviet Far East.

Nesterov, supporting the idea, said in the past the Soviet Union exported wheat to Europe and at the same time imported wheat into its eastern regions from Australia and Canada.

John Taylor, leader of the Canadian group, said Canadian businessmen are not sufficiently well informed of the potentialities of the Soviet market. Nesterov promised the Russian Chamber of Commerce would help Canadian businessmen establish contacts with Soviet foreign trade corporations. Useful in this respect would be the organization of industrial exhibitions.

Cairo Diplomat In Desert War Dies At Age 84

HASTINGS, England (AP)—Lord Killern, 84, career diplomat who, as Ambassador Sir Miles Lampson, masterminded political intrigues behind the procrustean British front at El Alemain in the Second World War, died Friday. Cause of death was not given.

His operations at Cairo were credited with foiling in considerable measure the pro-Axis efforts of Egyptians in the name of anti-British nationalism.

The British war effort against the pressure of Rommel's Afrika Korps at El Alemain was handicapped in 1941-42 by Egyptian political instability and outright opposition to the allied cause.

The then young King Farouk objected to the British choice of Mustafa Naha's Pasha as prime minister who would fit into the British plans. A British tank sent to Adin was gently nudged open an iron gate and Farouk capitulated, swearing he never would forswear the British or Lampson.

Lampson later was elevated to the peerage. He is survived by his widow, a son and two daughters by his first marriage and a son and two daughters by his second.

Long associated with Eastern diplomatic posts, he was appointed high commissioner for Egypt and the Sudan in 1954 and then first ambassador to Cairo in 1956. He held this post until 1962 when he was named special commissioner in Southeast Asia.

He played an important role in trying to act as a go-between the Dutch and the Indonesian nationalists in the immediate post-war period.

He retired in 1948.

Britain Opposes Cuban Efforts On Air Service

LONDON (AP)—British authorities see the newly opened Havana-Nassau air service as a bid by Fidel Castro to end the political isolation of Cuba, according to qualified informants.

They said here Britain intends fully backing efforts by the Bahamas colonial government to thwart that attempt.

The Johnson administration in Washington was portrayed as satisfied that British-Bahamas counter-measures may compel Cuba to drop its plans to make weekly and then possibly daily flights into Nassau.

The crew of a Soviet-built Tupayin airliner of Cubana Airlines, making the inaugural flight into Nassau Monday under a 14-year-old air pact with Britain, were greeted by 500 anti-Communist demonstrators who told the Cubans to go home.

One authorized British source offered this assessment of Castro's plan:

"Nassau is an important staging point for international air lines between Europe, north and south America.

"If Havana were linked with Nassau it would put Cuba back on to the international aviation network.

"Castro's followers then would have easier access to and from Europe and the Americans to perform their missions.

"The development would therefore be a big step towards enabling Cuba gradually to begin restoring contacts with the outside world and to draw out leaders into Cuba."
