

# Bonus Baby Hurls Orioles Back into AL First Place

NEW YORK (AP)—Dave McNally, a 20-year-old bonus boy who signed for \$20,000, pitched Baltimore back into the American League lead Saturday with a 4-2 victory over Los Angeles while Boston knocked Chicago out of first place 9-5.

McNally was replaced after the leadoff man in the ninth singled but he pitched fine ball. The Los Angeles runs came on a two-run homer by Ed Sadowski in the eighth. Jack LeBrund and Joe Galles homered off loser Bo Belinsky.

Boston doubled White Sox pitching for 11 hits, including a two-run double by La Clinton that broke a 1-1 tie in the third, and a three-run homer by Frank Malzone in the fourth. Jack Lamabe was the winner in relief when Gene Conley faltered after Boston had built a 9-1 lead.

**MANTLE RETURNS**

over Cleveland. Mickey Mantle returned to the Yankee lineup for the first time in two weeks but went hitless.

Minnesota Twins won their fourth straight, handing Detroit Tigers their eighth defeat in 10 games on a 9-3 romp behind Dick Siskman. Earl Battey drove in four runs while Siskman held the Tigers to five hits.

Kansas City moved into second place, only 14 percentage points behind the Orioles, by clubbing Washington 7-3, wrapping it up with four big runs in the ninth. It was the 15th victory for the Athletics in their last 16 meetings with the Senators. Bill Bryan's homer off loser Jim Duckworth broke a 1-1 tie in the sixth. Jim Piersall and Chuck Hinton homered for Washington. Dan Pritzer won with relief help.

**PITCHING PERFECT**

**Ralph Dupas Is Favored To Cop Title**

NEW ORLEANS (AP)—Oddsmakers have installed veteran Ralph Dupas a 7-to-3 favorite to wrest the world junior middleweight crown from champion Denny Meyer tonight.

For Dupas, the 27-year-old New Orleans fighter famed for his fancy footwork, it will be the third—and perhaps last—shot at a world's title.

The 13-year-veteran of the ring was knocked out—one of the two kayos in his career—by champion Joe Brown in a light-weight fight in 1958.

July, Dupas lost a close decision to welterweight champion Emile Griffith.

Meyer, a clean-cut 23-year-old father of three girls, will be defending the title in a recently-created division for the second time. The Portland, Ore., fighter was recognized as a middleweight champion last October after defeating Joey Giambra.

Dupas has been tagged as a runner because of his nimble-footwork. Meyer is fast foot, but in training hasn't shown the speed that is Dupas's trademark. Both are considered boxers rather than slammers.

The 15-round title fight is expected to draw a near capacity crowd in the 9,000-seat Municipal Auditorium.

The bout will not be televised. Dupas will carry a 40-7-2 record into the ring. Meyer has 28 victories and eight defeats.
