

A New Brunswick Sensation.
MYSTERIOUS DISAPPEARANCE OF A MAN WITH \$800—STORY TOLD BY THE TAVERN KEEPER.

Buctouche, Kent Co., N. B., is greatly agitated over the disappearance of the man Perry, which still continues a profound mystery. Perry was a perfect stranger in Buctouche. He belonged near Rimouski, Quebec. While in Buctouche, Perry stopped with Anthony White, keeper of the Two-mile house. According to the statement of the magistrate who held an enquiry, Perry remained at White's place until the morning of Saturday, November 28th. At about three o'clock on the morning of that day, White and a man named Cormier, living in another part of the country, went to Cocagne, a neighboring parish. Previous to starting they had several interviews at the bedside of Perry, who was sick. They returned about noon, and found, as they allege, that the stranger Perry had left soon after their departure and before daylight, since which time nothing has been heard of him. When Perry came to Buctouche he had a large sum of money said to be \$800 on his person. He had changed while in Buctouche, one fifty dollar bill on the National Bank of Quebec. He left all his clothing, rubber coat, besides ammunition and other effects at White's place,—all but his money. Perry is described as a well built man about 5 feet 11 high, square shoulders, black curly hair, moustache and whiskers, 35 years old. Anthony White played quite an important part in the celebrated Timothy McCarthy murder mystery at Shediac, in 1877. According to his own story his wagon was in the barn at Osborne's house where McCarthy was alleged to have been murdered, on the night the deed was alleged to have been committed. One theory was that White's wagon had been used to convey McCarthy's body to the river where it was found, but this was never clearly established; while according to his own story he had left his wagon in Osborne's barn and went to Amherst to sell oysters and when he returned found the wagon had been taken out of the barn, and he suspected that it had been used.

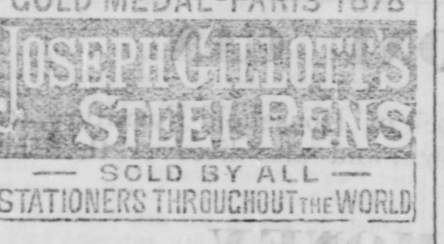

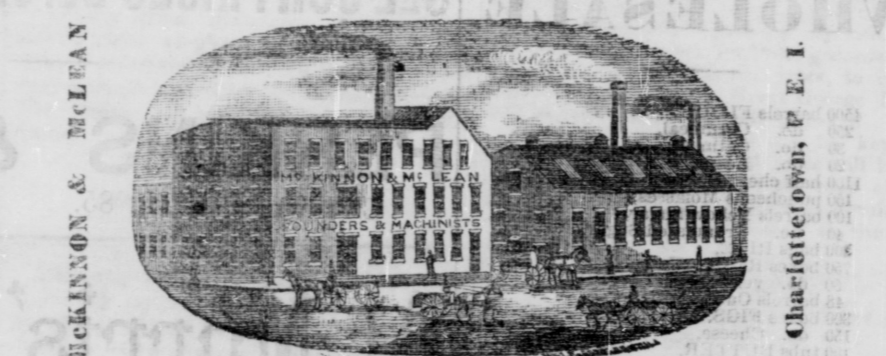
