A VOTE ON PROHIBITION WANTED.—Petitions were presented the other day to the commons from the Grand Divisions of the Sons of Temperance in Ontario, Quebec, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick asking that the temperance question should be removed from the sphere of party politics by the submission of a measure of prohibition to a vote to the electors of the Dominion.

MARITIME DISASTERS.—The Administration of the Bureau Veritas has published the list of maritime disasters reported during the month of February, 1888, concerning all flags: Sailing vessels reported lost, 101. In this number are included three vessels missing. Steamers reported lost 10. In this number is included one steamer reported missing. Causes of losses: Sailing vessels, stranded, 54; collision, 7; fire, 9; foundered, 4; abandoned, 10; condemned, 17; missing, 3. Steamers, stranding, 7; collision, 2; missing, 1.

A LARGE SOCIETY.—The year book of the Ancient Order of Foresters, which has been issued, shows them to be the largest friendly society in the world. At the end of 1887 the order comprised 294 districts, 5,128 courts, 686,127 benefit and 16,428 honorary members, the increase in the 12 months being 121 courts, 18,454 benefit and 774 honorary members. During the year 56,845 benefit members were admitted and 30,689 left the order; 6,890 members and 4,621 members' wives and widows died during the year. At December 1880, the united funds amounted to \$3,750,000. The juvenile societies are very progressive, the number at Dec. 31, 1887 being 1,248 having 72,377 members, with \$26,542 of funds, the increase in the year being 4,874, members, and \$7,323 of funds.

BRITISH PARLIAMENT

Report of Proceedings.

LONDON, April 13.

In the Commons this evening Mr. Goshen announced that the amount of consols converted was 454,000,000 pounds, leaving 850,000, the most of which was in the hands of trustees. There was still time to apply for the conversion.

On motion of Hon. Mr. Smith that the County Government Bill be given precedence over Private Member Bills.

Mr. Labouchere offered an indignant protest, saying that Smith played an astute game. He was hurrying the bill to prevent the house taking time to consider its merits.

Mr. Smith denied that he desired to shorten the discussion. The magnitude of the bill was such, that the Government would be remiss in their duty, if it failed to take every chance to forward the measure. Mr. Smith's motion was carried 243 to 143.

A meeting of the National Liberal Club to-day resolved to urge the Government to extend the debate in the Commons on the local government bill. All the speakers expressed the opinion that the feeling was growing, especially in rural districts, that the bill was a sham and a rank Tory measure, that its apparent democratic character was a veneering which at first deceived the eye.

Prof. Sturt said the fact that the bill omitted to deal with outdoor sale, while it proposed compensation to publicans, was a sufficient warrant to strong opposition to its adoption.

A committee was appointed to arrange for concentrated action by the Liberal party in opposition to the bill.

Ottawa News.

OTTAWA, April 13.

Mr. Justice Henry, whose life was spared of this afternoon, has rallied and is in a fair way of recovery. His trouble is apoplexy, not paralysis as at first reported.

Efforts will be made to prorogue Parliament by May 18th, in order to permit the Governor-General to sail from Quebec the following week.

The sum of \$7,350 will be offered in prizes at this year's Dominion Rifle Association meeting here.

Small Pox on Shipboard.

NEW YORK, April 13.

The steamer Newport arrived this morning seven days from Aspinwall. She brought 70 cabin and 23 steerage passengers. Eleven persons were removed to the hospital, some with small pox the others with varioloid. All on board were vaccinated. The detention of the crew and steerage passengers, and a portion of the other passengers will be necessary.

In Aid of the Flood Sufferers.

BERLIN, April 13.

A bill is being prepared for introduction into the Lower House of the Prussian Diet authorizing the issue of a loan of \$4,000,000 marks for the purpose of assisting the sufferers by the floods, and repairing dykes, river banks and railways.

A Temporary Arrangement.

WINNIPEG, April 13.

Premier Greenway states that in conversation with prominent Grand Trunk officials, the latter expressed their determination to secure Ontario into Manitoba, and that a temporary arrangement to reach the Province this year was probable.

Suspended.

NEW YORK, April 13.

The suspension of the American Exchange in Europe (limited) was reported to-day from London. William B. Boon, treasurer, was appointed receiver. Their liabilities are about \$4,000,000.

Declined to Proclaim Louth.

DUBLIN, April 12.

The Privy Council has declined to proclaim Louth under the Criminal Act as a prelude to the suppression of the National League.

Provincial Legislature.

HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.

SATURDAY, April 14.

MR. SUTHERLAND, after some preliminary remarks, referred to the financial position of the Province, contending that we were in a worse position than ever, notwithstanding the statements made in the speech of the Leader of the Government yesterday afternoon. The estimates for the current year were, he thought, considerably less than the expenditure would be.

Hon. DONALD FERGUSON followed. He pointed out that the payments for education amounted in 1878 to only about \$65,000—the Government of that year having paid only three-quarters salaries, while nearly \$112,000 were paid on account of education last year; and humorously disposed of some of the statements of the previous speaker.

House adjourned until Monday.
