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### Mounties Join In Search For Missing Fliers

OTTAWA, Aug. 11.—(CP)—Royal Canadian Mounted Police have joined in the search for pilot Cliff Fréchet and radio operator Edward Gaylor whose plane disappeared in northwestern Quebec more than five weeks ago.

Commissioner S. T. Wood said here tonight that an R.C.M.P. seaplane stationed at Moncton, N. B., had been ordered to fly to the Quebec north shore to join the search that has been in progress since the two men and airplane vanished last July 3.

In addition, said the Commissioner, C.M.P. detachments in the area have been instructed to watch out for signs of the missing aviators on their regular patrols through that wild country.

Aid of the R.C.M.P. was asked by Mrs. Albert Fréchet, wife of the missing pilot. Commissioner Wood said R.C.M.P. officers in Quebec were in charge of the search.

### Predicts Big Development Of North Country

SASKATOON, Aug. 11.—(CP)—Tremendous development of the Arctic country, known as "away up north," in the days to come was predicted by Hon. John Buchan, son of Lord Tweedsmuir, who has just returned to the outside after a year at Hudson's Bay Company posts in the far north.

The governor-general's son was stationed on Baffin Island, a large island at the northern extremity of the Canadian Arctic possession. He was interviewed by newsmen here today while en route with the governor-general to Jasper, Alta.

Mr. Buchan said he likes the north and plans to return as soon as circumstances permit. Walrus shooting was his favorite sport in the Arctic.

Not people regard the far north as a barren wasteland but, in predicting future development, Mr. Buchan recalled the early impressions of all Canada which was thought of in France and Great Britain as a land of ice and snow.

Not farming, Mr. Buchan said, has dealt a severe blow to the fur-trading and trapping industries in the north.

Fur-farming, however, will never entirely replace trapping as a source of supply, he said. In addition to those animals which do not thrive in captivity, there are some, such as the Arctic fox, which cannot be bred successfully in captivity at all.

If and when the northward march of civilization brings trapping to an end, the Eskimos may be able to return to their former farthest fastnesses in the north. The Indians, even in districts isolated, have relied upon the white man for so long they may never again be able to return to their original mode of life.

### Council Fails To Reach An Agreement

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Aug. 11.—(AP)—The American Federation of Labor's executive council failed today to reach a decision in the jurisdictional fight between the Stagehands and Actors' unions. It will meet again at 4 P.M. A.D.T. Monday to resume discussions.

A crowd had stood for four hours outside the council's door, while stage and screen stars remained in the A.F.L.'s hotel headquarters waiting for the "clear-out" decision which William Green, A.F.L. president, yesterday reported would be forthcoming "soon."

When the doors of the meeting room were opened, Green merely had this to say: "The executive council has not passed on anything thus far." Immediately after Green's announcement, the 4-A committee and members of the screen actors' guild flew back to New York City.

From there, said Ralph Morgan, president of the guild, the screen actors will fly to Los Angeles for a mass meeting of screen players there Sunday, and then fly back to Atlantic City in time for a Monday conference with A.F.L. officials.

### Players Must Have Transfers

TORONTO, Aug. 11.—The Canadian Amateur Hockey Association, through Registrar-Treasurer W. A. Hewitt today issued a warning that Canadian hockey players who wished to go to Scotland to play hockey must first have their transfers approved by the British Ice Hockey Association and the C. A. H. A.

"No Canadian hockey player can go to Scotland to play hockey unless his transfer has been approved by the British Ice Hockey Association and the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association," the statement said. "Otherwise the player will be suspended and barred from all organized hockey."

Applicants for transfer to the old country must come through the British Ice Hockey Association before receiving consideration by the C. A. H. A.

### REDUCE RATE.

MONTREAL, Que., Aug. 11.—With the advent of Labor Day on Monday, September 4, providing a long week-end for travel purposes, the railways will place in effect reduced fares consisting of one way fare and one quarter for the return, according to G. P. Riddell, chairman, Canadian Passenger Association. These fares will be good going from noon Friday, September 1, up to 2 p. m. on Monday, September 4, with return movement good up to midnight on Tuesday, September 5. Coach class fares will apply in coaches only. First class fares will be transferred on payment of regular charges for such accommodation.

### Banking House Suspends Payments

AMSTERDAM, The Netherlands, Aug. 11.—The banking house of Mendelssohn & Company—often the agent for European governments in marketing their securities—suspended payments today as a sequel to the death of its internationally known senior partner, Fritz Mannheimer.

The French finance ministry announced in Paris that bond issues in which the Mendelssohn firm had participated with a Netherlands-Swiss syndicate already were completed.

It said the issues, certain short term national defence loans, would be assured by the Paris and Netherlands bank here.

Mannheimer died last Wednesday in France but his death was not made known here until yesterday. A native of Germany who rose high in his financial world, Mannheimer became Amsterdam representative of Mendelssohn & Company and later took over its operations here when the advent of the Nazi regime brought reorganization of the parent interests in Germany.

### Three Powers To Resume Talks Today

(By The Canadian Press) MOSCOW, Aug. 11.—Because there is "no time to be lost," military talks among Great Britain, France and the Soviet Union to further formation of a European peace front will begin tomorrow in the defence commissariat.

The British delegation led by Admiral Sir Reginald Plunkett-Erle-Drax and the French, under General Joseph Doumenc, arrived here today after travelling by water from London to Leningrad.

The Soviet defence commissar, Marshal Klement Voroshiloff, received the military leaders who are seeking to link Russia with Britain and France in a three-way mutual assistance pact, suggested that the talks begin at once because there was "no time to be lost."

Under Russia's five-day work-week Saturday is normally a holiday in Moscow and there was some suggestion that the visitors use the weekend to take stock of their surroundings before settling down to a serious discussion. But Voroshiloff promptly proposed a meeting for Saturday morning and his guests agreed.

### Production Is Highest Since 1930

OTTAWA, Aug. 11.—(CP)—Canada's 1938 fisheries production reached the highest value since 1930, or approximately \$40,500,000, it was stated today by fisheries minister Michaud.

"As compared with 1937 results," Mr. Michaud said, "there was an increase last year of about \$1,500,000 in the marketed value of the 1938 reports is still in progress but such changes as it may make in present figures are not likely to be important."

British Columbia, Quebec, Prince Edward Island and Alberta were the provinces contributing to the 1938 gain over 1937. The major increase was in British Columbia where the value total was about \$18,670,000 as against some \$16,200,000 in the year before. In the other provinces, Mr. Michaud said, the respective totals for 1938 were as follows, rounded stated in all cases: Nova Scotia \$8,904,200; New Brunswick \$9,996,000; Ontario \$3,383,000; Quebec \$1,954,400; Manitoba \$1,811,100; Prince Edward Island \$830,900; Alberta \$492,900 and Saskatchewan \$473,600.

The removal of any infection present will require good judgment as to condition of the patient and the severity of the goitre symptoms. The treatment by rest will depend upon the mental physical, and, perhaps, financial ability of the patient and likewise requires close supervision by the physician. In regard to diet, flesh foods—fish, fowl, lamb, veal, and calves' liver—may be included in the heavy meal of the day only. Tea, coffee, condiments spices and alcoholics are forbidden. As extra nourishment may be necessary, milk, eggs, with occasionally cream may be given.

Among the medicines used are iodine, guanine, extract of ovary, and other gland extracts, and quieting drugs.  
The psychic treatment is to try to get the patient better adjusted to his circumstances and surroundings. It can be understood, then, how, by treating the whole individual, removing infection, rest, proper food, necessary medicines, and correcting poor adjustment to life—the cure of early goitre and even moderately advanced goitre may be possible without operation.

Dr. Israel Bram, Philadelphia, in his book "Exophthalmic Goitre and Its Medical Treatment" states: "First and foremost, we must
