TO PROTECT BRITISH INTERESTS

Russia and the Other Powers

A RUSSIAN JOURNAL'S SIGNIFICANT STATEMENT.

The Allies March Through the Forbidden City.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]
LONDON, Sept. 6.—Sir Alfred Gaselee's despatch, which shows that the situation in Peking was unchanged on August 29th, is the only Chinese news this morning. The cancellation of the order holding back the Fourth Indian Brigade is regarded as important. It shows that whatever is the outcome of Russia's policy the British Government is determined to have sufficient troops on the spot adequately to protect British interests.

Considerable significance is attached to the statement by the Journal de St. Petersburg as specially indicating a modification of Russian policy. It is noted that while the Journal de St. Petersburg announces Russia's determination to maintain the solidarity of the powers, it only mentions the withdrawal of the ministers and not of the troops at Tien Tsin. It is believed that the powers might agree to such modification of the original Russian proposals.

LONDON, Sept. 6.—General Sir Alfred Gaselee, commander of the British-Indian troops at Chinese capital, wires as follows: "Peking, Aug. 29th.—The allies marched through the Forbidden City yesterday, (Aug. 28th.) The British held third place in the procession, the Russians and Japanese being in greater strength."

Coal Cutters Want a Further Increase.

In the morning cutters were getting 40 cents per box of 1,700 pounds. They then asked for 45 cents and received a raise. They now demand 50 cents per box or 66 per ton instead of 60.

BRITISH PARLIAMENTS.

The Parliament of Great Britain and Ireland, which will shortly be dissolved, is the fourteenth of Queen Victoria's reign, and was elected in July and August, 1895. Since Her Majesty ascended the throne—June, 1837—the country has had the following Prime Ministers: Lord Melbourne, once; Sir Robert Peel, once; Lord John, afterwards Earl Russell, twice; Lord Derby, three times; Lord Aberdeen, once; Lord Palmerston, twice; Disraeli, afterwards Lord Beaconsfield, twice; Mr. Gladstone, four times; Lord Salisbury, three times; Lord Roseberry, once. Lord Salisbury, now in office, and Lord Roseberry are the only survivors of the distinguished men who have held the position.

The Hillsborough Bridge Contract.

THE PRICE WILL AGGREGATE A MILLION DOLLARS.

Governor Patterson's Successor—Elevated to the Senate.

OTTAWA, Sept. 6.—M. J. Haney, of Toronto, was in the city yesterday. Mr. Haney has been awarded the contract for a railway and traffic bridge for the P. E. Island railway over the Hillsborough river at Charlottetown. The contract price aggregates in the neighborhood of a million dollars. Mr. Haney has two years within which to complete the work. A short meeting of Council was held yesterday at which the appointment of Col. Macmillan, as Governor of Manitoba in succession to Governor Patterson, was made.

An order-in-Council appointing Mr. J. V. Ellis, M. P., Senator has been passed.
