

P. W. C. Scores 5-0 Win Over Mt. A. Second Team In Exhibition Rugby Game

The Prince of Wales College rugby team led by big Gordon Tweedy defeated Mount Allison University second team in an exhibition football game played Saturday at Memorial Field 5-0. Tweedy, a big 90 pounder, scored all the P.W.C. points by virtue of a try in the first half and a penalty kick in the second half.

The game opened with P.W.C. taking the kick-off and the ball was on the Mount A. 25 yard line within a matter of minutes. The city boys kept applying the pressure in the first half. Their efforts were finally rewarded at the 15 minute mark when Tweedy scooped up a loose ball on a fumble by the Mount A. fullback and slung over the line for the opening try. The convert was taken by David MacLeod and he failed as it was from a very difficult angle.

In the second half Mount Allison had the edge on the play as their scrum, who were heavier than the P.W.C. scrum, kept getting the ball out to their kept kicking and as a result great gains were made by the Mount A. backfield. At the 10 minute mark of his half P.W.C. were awarded a penalty kick as a Mount Allison player being over anxious was caught off side. Tweedy took the kick and made good from about 35 yards out.

Twice in the dying minutes of the game Mount A. were on the P.W.C. 5 yard line but failed to go over on both occasions.

Other outstanding players for the P.W.C. team were Cliff Ready, Jack Ladner, Norris Mizuno. The Mount A. team was led by Jones, their picking quarter who was a long concern all afternoon, MacDonald and Flumen the big fullback.

No Heavyweight In Sight In Rocky Marciano's Class

WASHINGTON, (AP) — The National Boxing Association made its official Monday. There isn't a heavyweight fighter in Rocky Marciano's class.

For the first time since Joe Louis was in his heyday, the NBA left a big blank in the "logical contender" slot among the heavyweights.

The NBA's fall ratings gave the same vote of confidence to Jimmy Carter, the world lightweight champion. No logical contender was reported in sight in that division.

Roland LaStarza, who was benched Marciano in the summer ratings, slumped to third place among the heavyweight division's outstanding boxers as a result of his technical knockout loss to the champion last month.

Moving ahead of LaStarza were Dan Bucceroni of Philadelphia and former champion Ezzard Charles of Cincinnati. Nino Valdez of Cuba got a fourth-place rating among the outstanding boxers.

The NBA issued ultimatums to two champions to defend their titles or risk losing their crowns. These warnings went to Archie Moore, the light-heavyweight champion, and Percy Basset, who holds the interim featherweight title while titlist Sany Saddler is in the army.

Most-cluttered division was the middleweight, where the title has been vacant since the retirement of Sugar Ray Robinson. The 1-2 logical contenders, Randy Turpin and Carl Bobo Olson, fight for the championship Oct. 21.

White got up at the count of eight and held on. In the next round he carried the fight to Whyntott and had the winner in trouble several times.

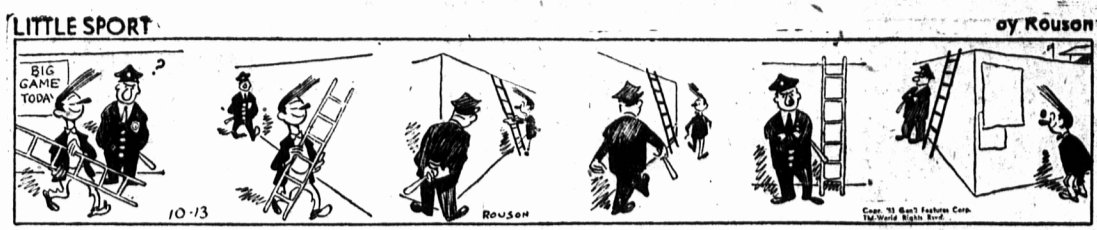
Whyntott rallied and finished the strong of the two.

Port William-born Dave Gathrum was flown to the Motor City Sunday, after Sawchuk suffered a knee injury Saturday night, and shut out Toronto Maple Leafs 4-0. He stopped 22 shots, two of them close-in drives by Leaf captain Ted Kennedy in the last two minutes of play.

Three games were played Sunday and two Saturday. The Leafs opened their home series Saturday night with an easy 6-2 win over Chicago Black Hawks. In Montreal, the Canadiens downed Detroit 4-1.

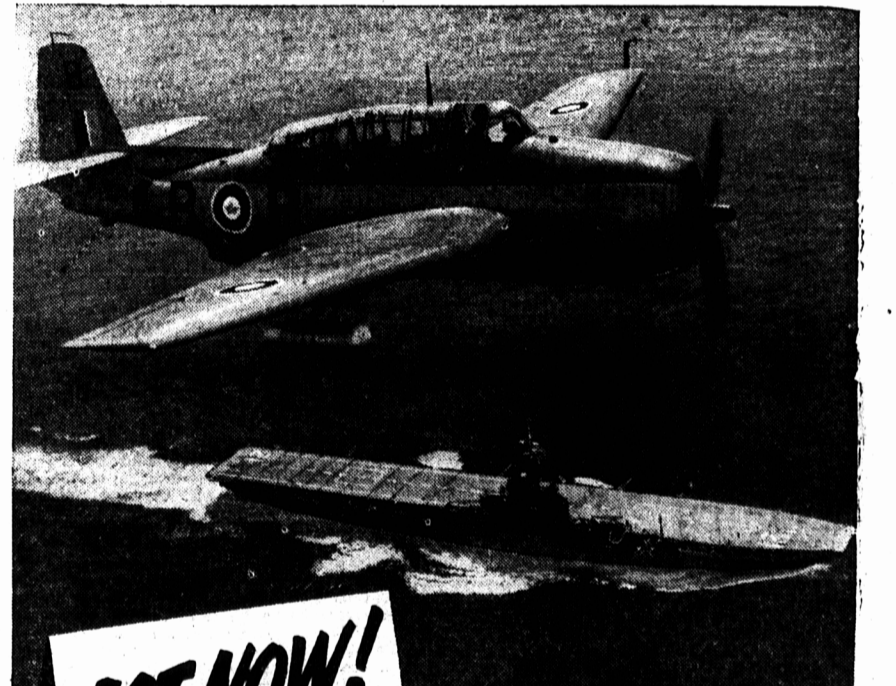
Sydney claim they still own Tyshko but he denied any knowledge of this last night.
