THE CANADIAN MILITIA.—A correspondent of the Ottawa Citizen draws attention to the falsity of the contention put forward by Sir Wilfrid Laurier, and later on by his friend, Mr. B. Trassas, of Labelle, in his speech at Papineauville, that the government cannot, under the provisions of the militia act, call out Canada's militia for service in the Transvaal. Clause 79 of the act provides that Her Majesty, in whom the chief command of the forces of Canada is vested, may call out for active service either within or without Canada, the militia force of Canada. This disposes of Mr. Trassas's question of "precedent," except so far as the actual offering of troops is concerned. Under the act the British authorities can call upon the Canadian government to furnish troops, and it will have to comply under the provisions of the militia act. The government is also authorized to arrange for the transportation of troops to any point, presumably within or without Canada, where they may be ordered for service.
