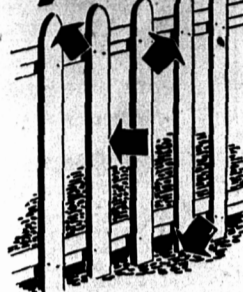

They settled at Millview, P.E.I. where he spent his boyhood and received his early education.

Miss Jean MacDonald was a recent visitor at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Stirling Moore, Mt. Pleasant.

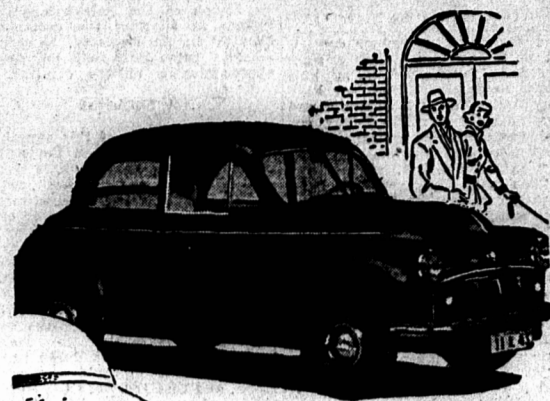

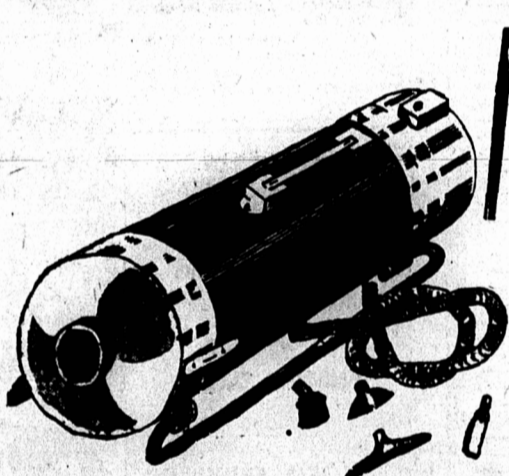

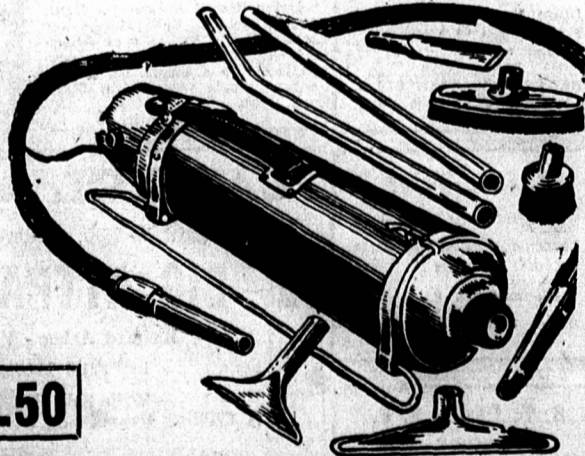
