### Atlantic Liners.

There are fully 1,000 tons of piping of various kinds, it is said, in the average Atlantic liner. The condensers will pump up at least 50,000,000 tons of cool water a day. The furnaces will consume no less than 7,500,000 cubic feet of air an hour. The boiler tubes, if placed in a straight line, would stretch nearly ten miles and the condenser tubes more than 25 miles.

### Smoothing Irons.

Irons may be made to last for years, and they may be treated in such fashion as to wear out in a few months. The first great secret in their preservation is to keep them from rusting. To this end, when not in use, they should be stowed away in a clean, dry place. If, in spite of this care, or, more likely, because of some neglect, they should still become rusty, rub them thoroughly with lard and beeswax and then with sandpaper.
