Local and Other Items.

I. O. O. F.—Charlottetown Lodge, No 68, meets tonight in Wright's Hall. Visiting brethren welcome.

FIFTEEN POINT TEA.—The Fifteen Point tea took place on Tuesday. A great many people turned out and enjoyed the fine day and the attractions of the tea. Over \$1250 was realized.

EPWORTH LEAGUE.—The Financial District meeting and the Epworth League Convention of the Charlottetown District of the Methodist Church, will be held at Winsloe, on Wednesday next, the 24th of August. All Epworth Leaguers are members of the convention. The P. E. I. Railway has kindly extended the consideration of one fare; and certificates signed by the secretary of the convention will enable delegates and visitors to return free.

EXPORT OF EGGS.—The total shipment this season from Montreal up to July 23rd were 8,834 cases, as compared with 6,209 cases for the same period last year, showing an increase of 2,535 cases, which is very gratifying indeed. The bulk of the shipments this season have gone to Liverpool, while Glasgow has taken a large share. The total exports of eggs from Canada in 1897 were 4,677,690 dozen, which amounted in value to \$795,180. The total exports for 1896 were 5,003,170 dozen, which were valued at \$700,284.

HARD ON NOVA SCOTIA.—"It is a land of whitewashed houses in the most unforbidding place that man could choose for his place of abode, edibles are of the commonest kind, boiled potatoes, salt pork and tea being a fair sample of the favorite bill of fare. The people have been here so long that they cannot tell their own nationality, or at least the nationality of their forefathers. The population is a mixture of Irish, Dutch, Scotch and English. The most particular thing is the consolidation of all religions in the Baptist faith. Every locality has its peculiar dialect. People generally are blubber-faced, narrow-chested, unhealthy people, who are an easy prey to consumption, which is most prevalent in this country. I am told that the germ is in the water, which is as red as a fox's tail. The country is reeking with water on account of the bed-rock being so close to the surface, and being impenetrable to moisture. The undulating country is filled with lakes, which extend in chains across the province in all directions. The people are in the midst of a good goldfield, but will not give up the life on the sea for fortunes of the mines, which might necessitate a little labor."—This choice extract is copied from an article on Nova Scotia in the Colorado Daily News of August 2. 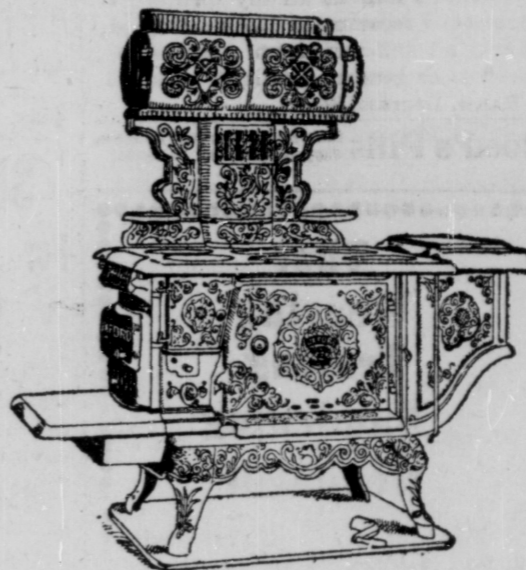
