Brazil Posting Goes To Luce

WASHINGTON (AP) — Clare Boothe Luce easily won Senate confirmation as ambassador to Brazil Tuesday and almost immediately set off a new uproar. She and Senator Wayne Morse (Dem. Ore.), her chief critic, raised pointed questions about each other's sanity.

And in the midst of the storm that followed, her editor-husband, Henry R. Luce, said in New York he had asked her to offer her resignation as a result of Senate criticism.

"That would be good for the country," Morse said.

Several senators accused Mrs. Luce of going too far, indulging in intemperate language and even abusive.

CONTRACT BRIDGE

Partner bids One Diamond, next player passes, both sides vulnerable. What would you now bid with each of the following four hands?

1. Three notrump. This is far and away the most enlightening bid that can be made. The direct response of three notrump identifies a hand containing 16 to 18 high card points, strength in the three unbid suits, and notrump distribution (usually 4-3-3-3).

As a result, the opening bidder is in prime position to determine the best final contract. If he has a minimum opening bid and is able to play notrump, he passes. If the opener has values in excess of a minimum opening bid, he is in excellent position to contract for a slam, knowing the exact nature of the responder's hand.

A three club response must be regarded as incorrect. It would suggest distributional possibilities which do not exist and would not pinpoint the high card holding of 16 to 18 points guaranteed by a three notrump response.

2. One spade. One of the most important principles of bidding is that it is generally better to reach a contract of four spades or hearts than it is to reach three notrump, provided the partners between them have as many as eight trumps in the major suit.

An eight-card major suit trump fit is difficult to find if the player with the five-card length does not name the suit. His partner, with only three cards in the suit, can hardly be expected to name the suit. The high card weakness of the five-card suit should not be permitted to stand in the way of its nomination.

3. Two clubs. Every effort should be made to identify the 4-4-0-5 distribution, so that the best playable trump suit may be found. By bidding clubs first, intending to show spades and hearts secondarily, the responder identifies the greater club length. Partner will thus be able to judge that the club suit is longer because, if the clubs had been equal in length to the spades and hearts, the higher ranking suits would have been named first.

4. One heart. The hand is too strong to bid two diamonds, which shows 6 to 9 points, and too weak to bid three diamonds, which shows 13 to 16 points. The compromise bid of one heart is therefore made, which shows 6 to 16 points. Poor as the heart suit is, it is better to name it and misrepresent its texture than it is to misrepresent the strength and promise of the hand by bidding either two or three diamonds.

CCF'er Suggests Dropping Gordon

OTTAWA (CP)—A CCF Member of Parliament Wednesday suggested that better staff relations and greater efficiency would follow if Donald Gordon no longer headed the Canadian National Railways.

Frank Howard, Skeena, said he doesn't mean that the government should get rid of Mr. Gordon "in an out-of-hand way." But insofar as the CNR employees were concerned, relations would be more harmonious and greater efficiency would result if the president was a man who knew more about railroading.

He said in the Commons that the 58-year-old Mr. Gordon, CNR president since Jan. 1, 1950, does not inspire his employees with the sort of faith and confidence he should. As long as that was the case, the railway was going to be plagued by inharmonious relations between management and employees.

MORE CRITICISM

Also critical of Mr. Gordon during consideration of a government resolution to set up the annual railway committee study of the publicly-owned line was Douglas Fisher (CCF-Port Arthur).

Mr. Fisher said there is growing uncertainty among CNR employees about their job future and the future of railway communities.

Lionel Chevrier (L—Montreal Laurier), overlooking transportation problems over a wide area, suggested that the government make up its mind about whether to build a railway through northern Alberta to Great Slave Lake.

But press secretary James C. Hagerty said at the White House that Mrs. Luce had not been in touch with anyone there since the vote on confirmation and added: "There has been no resignation."

A flurry of White House telephone calls to Senator Everett Dirksen of Illinois, the Senate Republican leader, indicated that a resignation might be imminent.

Henry Luce, editor of Time magazine, said in a statement, Mrs. Luce had offered "a few days after the Bolivian incident" to have her name withdrawn but that Christian A. Herter, acting as secretary of state, refused her offer.

NEW YORK (AP)—Premier Nikita Khrushchev is going to get a surprise shortly — a \$6 cheque.

He'll probably be surprised about what it's for, too—poor Russian children.

And quite likely he'd be even more surprised as to why he's getting it—because a New York importer booted over about a \$2 fine for littering the sidewalk in front of his business.

The importer Norman S. Muller, maintained he wasn't littering. He said he had to open a crate there and actually was cleaning up when an officer handed him a litter ticket.

All made him so sore he sat right down and fired off letters to the governor, the mayor, the police commissioner and others. At the same time he sent the \$6 cheque to Khrushchev, with a note saying: "As charity known no boundaries, I am herewith sending to you \$6 — for poor Russian children. You may use this amount in your own discretion for charity."

That was April 24. So far Muller hasn't heard from any of them.

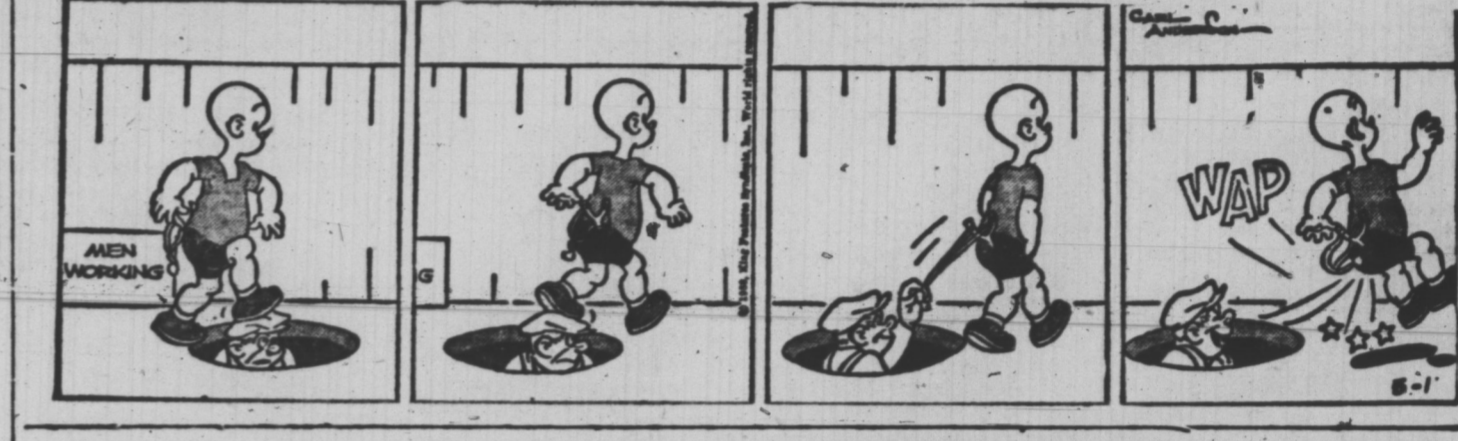
