Continued from page 1 companies, express companies, land companies, loaning land companies, banks, bankers, financing companies, investment companies or brokers, or any other financial business, department stores or retail merchants dealing in more than five branches of retail trade or business. Also covered are barristers, solicitors, notaries public, physicians, osteopaths, aurists and other medical men and other businessmen of the city from agents to private detectives. Various businesses will also be affected from laundries to transportation systems. The new by-law was briefly introduced by Councillor E. C. Johnston, Chairman of the Finance Committee, who spoke of the fact the financial requirements next year will be higher for both de from the new school. Councillor J. Storey suggested the possibility of setting up some machinery for the collection of arrears of property taxes and both personal and poll taxes which are now simply carried on the books. Councillor Johnston noted that some poll taxes have been owing for 13 to 15 years.

Street Work Reviewed

In his Street Committee report Councillor Storey said that the work of repairing sidewalks was proceeding slower than had been expected due to weather conditions and the fact that there was a great deal of complete square replacements necessary due to broken and shattered cement. However, he expressed the belief that it would be at least two years before the City would again have to take on the job on a big scale. Difficulties faced by residents of the East End of the City during the heavy rainstorms and also by those on Chestnut Street were discussed. On the latter it was felt that work should be done to build up the street to allow the water to get into the catch basins. At the East end of Grafton it was felt that the Canadian National Railway had a responsibility for the lack of drainage at the Green Bridge and certain culverts at Kent Street. However, it thought by Councillor Storey that the bridge was the responsibility of the City alone. Mayor J. D. Stewart offered the suggestion that the Street Committee meet jointly with the Provincial Government and the C.N.R. to determine what might be accomplished. It was also reported that Warren Paving Company would get its street patching program underway today.

Stray Dog Nuisance

There was a considerable amount of discussion relative to the large number of dogs running loose in the city and many Councillors felt that the immediate appointment of a dog catcher was an absolute necessity. Although no decision was reached it was the general feeling that whoever was named to the position should be on a full time basis and be provided with transportation adequate for the job. Councillor Elmer MacDonald, chairman of the Tenders Committee, told of those received for the job and said that several officers of the Police had complained that the dogs were not of good enough quality and asked that they be given the money and permitted to buy their own instead. It was decided to allow the Police Committee to buy shoes outside the tenders at a price not to exceed \$10 per pair. It was also agreed to permit the Street Committee to proceed with the sidewalks work, at a price not to exceed that now being paid, for another mile or mile and one-half of sidewalks beyond the amount originally decided on by the Council.

Airport Maintenance

Councillor Gormley suggested that the City should make a definite move regarding the Airport maintenance staff of the Maritime Central Airways. He believed that the staff was to be reduced and this would have a serious effect on the already acute unemployment situation here. Mayor Stewart agreed and said he would write to Ottawa endeavoring to learn what might be done. However, he believed that with the changeover in the type of service of the R.C.A.F. at Summerside there would be no call for the maintenance formerly provided by M.C.A.

Routine Business At S'side Council Meeting

Two resolutions were the chief items of business before a short meeting of the Summerside Town Council last evening. One of the resolutions approved the calling of tenders for the supplying of a police patrol car to the town of Summerside. The other resolution granted a special permit to Horne's Auto Paris for the construction of a building on the corner of Spring and Foundry Streets. This building, which is to be built according to plans and specifications approved by the council, is to be used for the wholesale and retail sale of auto parts. Councillor Lidstone, reporting for the electric light committee, said that the newest motor in the electric light plant had been overhauled and is now ready for use. He said it had been in operation 5000 hours since its last overhaul. Mayor Wedge said the repair work on this engine had been done entirely by the electric light plant personnel. Councillor Clark reported on the possible construction of steps between the softball diamond and the children's section of the park. The meeting was presided over by Mayor Henry Wedge and Councillors Clarence Steele, Donald Lidstone, William Jenkins, Dr. Hillard Clarke and James MacDougall were in attendance. Shortly before the meeting adjourned a request by telephone was received from Kinkora asking for the loan of the pumper truck to help fight a fire that threatened a part of the village. The truck was dispatched immediately.—S.

Continued from page 1 morning, August 13, at 10 o'clock and the question of calling by-elections was discussed. The Executive Council, knowing that a member of the Provincial Legislature is not eligible to nominate as a candidate in a Federal election, assumed that Mr. MacDonald's resignation was in proper form. "It was agreed that since Mr. MacDonald had resigned, two by-elections, one in Queen's and one in King's, would be called immediately and the polling date was set for September 10. Subsequently to the calling of the election, Mr. Speaker handed Mr. MacDonald's resignation to His Honour, the Lieutenant-Governor. Mr. MacDonald's resignation was in the following words: "July 25, 1953. Hon. Forrest Phillips, Speaker, Legislative Assembly, Charlottetown, P. E. I. "Dear Mr. Phillips: "I have been informed that in order to contest the Federal Election on August 10, that it is necessary to resign my provincial seat in 3rd. King's. If such is the case I hereby respectfully tender my resignation to you. With kindest personal regards, I remain "Yours very truly, "(Sgd.) J. A. MacDonald. "The above letter was delivered by His Honour to the Clerk of the Executive Council on Saturday, August 15. On Monday, August 17, the Government considered the resignation of Mr. MacDonald's resignation and decided it was ineffective as it did not comply with Section 25, sub-section 2 of The Legislative Assembly Act, (R.S.P. E.I. 1951 Chap. 85) which requires the signature of the resigning member to be made in writing under his hand before two subscribing witnesses. "The Government therefore rescinded the order-in-council inflicting the two by-elections insofar as it affected the 3rd. Electors' District of King's County and thereupon His Honour the Lieutenant-Governor recalled the By-Election Writ for the 3rd. Electors' District of King's."

Canadian Arsenals To Boost Output

OTTAWA, (CP)—The government's munitions-producing company, Canadian Arsenals, Ltd., expects to step up production to \$7,000,000 a month in the coming year, Defence Production Minister Howe said today. The minister made the prediction as he made public the annual report of the company for the 1952-53 fiscal year showing that production in that period had been increased to the value of \$5,000,000 a month from \$1,000,000. Mr. Howe said the company has a \$200,000,000 backlog of business. Further orders may be expected through 1953-54. It was not expected there would be any cut-backs in present commitments, but some "readjustment" might be expected on future orders. Canadian Arsenals reported 1952-53 production of \$43,199,000, of which \$11,252,000, the largest single amount, was for radar and other instruments. Net profit was \$2,205,611 on sales of \$38,756,808. A total of \$6,000,000 was turned back to the government, and the company did not withdraw any funds from the parliamentary appropriation for operating and maintenance expenses.

MORE POWER

The power of horseshoe-shaped magnets may be preserved by a bar of soft steel near the top. BIRMINGHAM, England, (CP) An iron-nerved thrust known as "Thelma" for the second year in a row is rearing her babies among noisy high-voltage electrical machinery at a power station here.

Fire Threatens Portion Of Kinkora As Barn Burns

Fire, which for a time threatened part of the village of Kinkora, early last evening, completely destroyed a barn belonging to Mr. Fred Coady. Another barn, belonging to Mr. James Callaghan, which was located about three feet from the corner of the burned barn, was saved through the continuous efforts of local men with assistance from the pumper truck of the Summerside Fire Department. However, it caught fire several times. The wind, which was blowing from a southeasterly direction, tended to fan the flames toward several nearby houses and other buildings which would have been in the path of the fire had it not been brought under control. A loft full of hay and a quantity of vegetables were destroyed by the fire, but a calf, the only livestock in the building at the time was led to safety. The fire was first observed about 5.00 p. m., when it was already breaking through the roof of the building. An alarm was sounded and the Kinkora Fire Department responded immediately and fought the blaze with stirrup pumps and barrels of water, brought down from the fire hall, a few yards from the burning building. Help gathered from several sections and several trucks carrying large barrels being hauling water from a brook about a mile away from the village. In addition to stirrup pumps and bucket brigade, a power sprayer owned by Charles McCordie played an important part in spreading water on the burning building. It is not definitely known how the fire began but persons at the scene of the fire expressed the opinion that it might have been started by sparks or burning paper which might have blown from an incinerator basket in which some refuse was being burned about 25 yards from the burned barn.—S.
