Montague Projects Making Progress

"The preliminary work of excavating the cellar for the new Federal building at Montague is almost completed. During the past week the Higginbotham residence, which was located at the corner of the land, was hauled to the rear of the property and will eventually be removed to a new location. Immediately thereafter the work of excavating the cellar was begun, and it is rapidly nearing the final stage.

The new Montague bridge is also proceeding ahead with the abutment pillars at the north end in place, and the rock fill-in around the pillars placed. Also over half the 10 pillars for one of the centre supports have been put into place. A total of 34 pillars altogether are required, seven at each end for the abutments, and 19 for each of the centre supports. These concrete steel-reinforced pillars are poured on the approach and afterward raised and driven through the silt fill-in to bed rock. On these will be poured the cement steel-reinforced lower deck, and above this the roadway, 24 feet in width. There will also be a five foot sidewalk.

The outside work on the new nurses' residence at the King's County Hospital is nearing completion, and workmen inside are completing the installation of the heating, plumbing and electric wiring. Insulation has also been placed on the second storey, and it is expected that the interior finish work will get underway in the near future.

Charlottetown Teachers Federation Meeting

Sister St. Clare was elected the new president of the Charlottetown Teachers' Federation at a meeting held in Rochford Square School yesterday. Others elected for the coming year were: Vice-president, Mr. J. Reginald MacDonald; secretary-treasurer, Miss Alice Frowse; member of the executive, Miss Alice Fraser; ex-officio, Mr. Donald MacBeath.

Elected to the board of governors were: Miss Mabel Matheson of Prince Street; L. P. Callaghan of Queen Square; Norman MacLeod of West Kent, and Sister St. Elaine of Rochford Square.

The retiring president, Mr. Donald MacBeath presided during the session and in his address reviewed the various activities carried out by the executive during the year. He recommended that there be continuity of representation in the Charlottetown Teachers' Institute and suggested that a member of the past executive become an ex-officio member of the incoming executive. This suggestion was put in the form of a resolution which was duly passed by the meeting.

Henceforth the retiring president will act as an ex-officio member in the new executive.

Miss Estelle Bowness in the capacity of acting general secretary, gave a comprehensive report of the P. E. I. T. P. activities. This report will be printed in its entirety at a later date.

The forenoon session featured sectional grade meetings during which lively discussions took place regarding curriculum and teachers' problems. Reports were prepared and were later presented to the general meeting.

Mr. K. A. Parker, superintendent of the City schools stressed the necessity of the teachers endeavoring to improve public relations as regards the home and school. They should lose no opportunity, the speaker said, of making parents and other interested persons realize what our schools are doing in the work of education. The Home and School Organization, continued Mr. Parker, is one of the most important vehicles through which we as teachers can make our work known to the community, and build up in our people a consciousness of the importance of our profession.

Mr. Parker discussed at length the report card which, he said, is most significant in acquainting parents with the progress of their children. The present type of card is antiquated, he said. It is now accepted that the academic record is the least meaningful part of the report to parents who should be more concerned as to whether the child is co-operative, honest, a good citizen, has good health habits and attitudes.

The close attention given by the teachers showed their interest in the vital topics so ably dealt with by the speaker.

Afternoon Session

The afternoon session began with reports from four groups that got together during the morning. There were no resolutions passed but several suggestions were brought up, among which were: Latin, Algebra and Geometry classes should be left until the pupils reach Grade Nine. More emphasis should be placed on accuracy and speed in working arithmetic during the intermediate grades and such a booklet should be on course. During the afternoon session Dr. L. W. Shaw greatly interested his listeners as he chose for his topic: Teaching Reading. He advised the teachers of all grades: 'Emphasize the silent aspect of reading.' He said that it was clearly shown to those who corrected the Entrance Examinations of Grade Ten that pupils cannot read to follow directions. They too often do not answer what is asked and it appears that they are not reading the questions intelligently. The group broke up into four groups for discussion. Each was led by a Summer School student. Miss Mary Gamble had charge of a Science group; Miss Alice Fraser spoke on Primary Methods; Miss MacNeill spoke on Class Room Management, and Sister St. Bernadette told of the General Refresher Course held at Prince of Wales College. A panel discussion was then held under the direction of Mr. Derrill McLaughlin. The four members of the panel: Misses Mabel Matheson and Ann Walsh, Sister St. Elaine and Mr. Austin Kennedy discussed various problems of interest. The chairman appointed a committee to look into all the aspects of Summer Schools for teachers. The resolutions were read by Mr. J. A. S. Williams, after which the

Glace Bay Police Officer Convicted

GLACE BAY, N.S. (CP)-Dale Burchell, 42-year-old Glace Bay policeman, was convicted Friday of illegal possession of parts of a still.

Three others involved in the case, set off by the death of a man in a basement explosion, were remanded until next Thursday. Cecil Mills, owner of the house, is charged with possessing a still. His brother Edgar and Joseph Whalen face the same charges as Burchell.

Town police probing the death of Edgar Soper, 65, found he was taken to hospital by a man who left immediately after he was admitted. Further investigation uncovered the still.

RCMP said Burchell told them he had been given \$5 by Whalen to haul the still parts to the town dump. He had done so.
