

### Considers Offer From Swedish Hockey Ass'n

LETHBRIDGE, Alta., May 3 — (CP) — Dick Gray, 31-year-old playing coach of the world champion Lethbridge Maple Leafs, said today he is seriously considering an offer from the Swedish Hockey Association.

Gray said that Swedish officials offered him a position as supervisor of their entire hockey system while the Leafs were in Sweden on an exhibition tour recently.

Gray said the officials got in touch with him again in Paris just before Leafs defeated the Swedish team 5-1 in the final game of the world tournament.

A veteran in the amateur hockey league, Gray, a native of Medicine Hat, Alta., said if he decides to accept the offer he will leave Canada in October and return next April.

NEWARK, England, May 3 — (AP) — Ki Ming, an Irish-bred colt owned by a Chinese restaurateur and ridden by an Australian jockey, raced to a surprise victory today in the Two Thousand Guineas, first of the English flat racing classics.

Held at 100 to 8 odds, Ki Ming won the mile race by 1 1/2 lengths over two other long shots, who battled for the place in a photo finish. Stokes, 33 to 1, was second. Milkas Boy, 40 to 1, took third.

### Winnipeg Man Chosen A.H.L. Rookie of Year

NEW YORK, May 3 — (CP) — Wally Hergeshimer of Cleveland Barons, has been chosen the American Hockey League's rookie of the year.

With the league's nine coaches voting for three candidates on a 5-3-1 points basis, Hergeshimer received 34 points out of a possible 45.

The flashy rightwinger, a Winnipeg product, will receive the Dudley (Red) Garrett Memorial Trophy plus a league bonus of \$300. He was also chosen as right-winger of the league's second all-star team, which earned him \$200.

Hergeshimer scored 83 points during the regular season in 71 games. His 42 goals set a record of tallies for a first-year player.

During the Calder Cup playoffs, he sparked the Barons to the title with 11 goals in 11 games—a play-off record. In five of their eight playoff victories, he supplied the winning goal, breaking another record.

Turco II runs in the colors of William Woodward of New York. North Carolina is owned by Mrs. Josephine Bryce.

Ki Ming won \$14,731 (\$42,000), a record purse for the event, for owner Billy Ley On. In addition, the London restaurant proprietor won the first half of a betting double which will net him about \$60,000 if Ki Ming captures the derby at Epsom Downs, May 30.

Ki Ming, which means Star of the West, was ridden by Arthur Breasley. Another Australian rider, Billy Cook, was aboard Malkas Boy.

The winner was timed in 1:42.35 and his performance established him as a favorite for the Derby.

### CNR Appointment

MONTREAL, May 3—The appointment of R. O. Stewart to be assistant chief engineer, construction, for the Canadian National Railways, was announced here today by Barton Wheelwright, chief engineer. Formerly engineer of bridges, Mr. Stewart is succeeded in that post by T. H. Jenkins, bridge engineer, Toronto. Both will have headquarters at Montreal.

Mr. Stewart was born at Lindsay, Ont., and began his railway career as assistant bridge engineer at Moncton, in 1913. In 1921, he was appointed assistant engineer of bridge standards at Toronto and two years later came to Montreal in the same capacity. He was named engineer of bridge standards in 1931 and in 1932 became assistant structural engineer. In the same year he was appointed assistant engineer of bridges and in 1942 was named engineer of bridges.

Mr. Jenkins, a native of Toronto, entered railway service at Detroit as a draughtsman in 1926. He became chief draughtsman there in 1940 and bridge engineer in 1947. In 1949, he was appointed bridge engineer for the central region with headquarters at Toronto.
