### ADMIRAL DEWEY WANTS THE OREGON.

#### His Request Causes Much Excitement.

THOUGHT THAT HE MAY REQUIRE OTHER FORCES.

Probably Wants the Ship to Overawe the Insurgents.

WASHINGTON, Feb 25.—A cablegram from Admiral Dewey asking for the Oregon was received with surprise by the officials here.

No one knows the nature of the political reason which the Admiral says demands the immediate presence of the battleship. The cablegram was taken to the Cabinet meeting and was fully discussed there.

No other subject was considered by the Cabinet.

It is thought a request for further details will be made.

The Admiral, it is said, possibly feels that the moral effect of the presence of the big ship upon the insurgents themselves would be good but there is an underlying doubt whether or not the Admiral may not be sighting a gathering cloud in the East and is looking for the prevention of any possible intervention or interference by European powers in the struggle now in progress near Manila.

### NARROW ESCAPE OF THE BULGARIA

#### Had Fourteen Feet of Water in Her Hold

MANY OF THE PASSENGERS AND CREW INJURED.

But Steamer has at Last Escaped her Perils

PONTA DEL GUDA, Feb 25.—The missing steamer Bulgaria arrived yesterday under her own steam.

At one time there was fourteen feet of water in the hold and the pumps were choked with grain.

The British steamer Antillian had the Bulgaria in tow once and lost her.

Many passengers and members of the crew had their legs and arms broken in the rolling of the ship, she being without a rudder.

Finally, two days ago, the weather moderated and a rudder was fixed up and by slow degrees the steamer reached port.

A large part of her cargo was jettisoned.

### JAPAN THREATENS TO RETALIATE

#### The British Columbia Exclusion Act is Enforced.

AN INTERVIEW WITH A LEADING JAPANESE BUSINESS MAN.

Says Japan Can and Will Adopt Retaliatory Measures.

OTTAWA, Feb 25.—Japan will retaliate against Canada if the British Columbia Exclusion Act is enforced, said Shaw T. Nishimur, of Yokohama, in an interview to-day. The Japanese, he continued, are a progressive people and any country to which they emigrate they will help to develop. As a commercial power Japan is going ahead and will be able to give effect to retaliatory measures.

Nishimur is the head of several of the Japanese tea houses, and has been in the United States on business.

### BEEF SHIPPED TO MILES' ARMY.

Testimony That it Remained on a Porto Rico Wharf For a Month.

WASHINGTON, Feb 21.—The army board of survey, appointed to enquire into the condemnation of 300,000 pounds of refrigerated beef consigned to General Miles' Porto Rico expedition in the war, has covered most of the ground involved in the examination and expects to give its finding soon.

This particular board was not an outgrowth of the charges made by Gen. Miles' concerning the quality of the beef furnished the troops. It was appointed in the regular course to inquire into the reason for condemnation of this particular cargo and to decide whether Swift & Co, from whom the beef was purchased, or the government was responsible for its spoiling.

The board is already convinced that the beef was in good condition when delivered by the contractors, and that it had not been chemically treated.

The evidence so far brought out by the board shows that the beef was duly discharged at Porto Rico, and that it lay on a wharf for a month without any care. No attempt was made to learn its condition in that period, and when finally opened it was found unfit for use and nothing remained but to condemn it.
