

Harness Racing Season To Open In Ch'town In Mid-June

Mr. H. J. Kennedy of the Provincial Exhibition Association announced over the weekend that the harness racing season will open in Charlottetown as scheduled and as in past years will be sponsored by the Charlottetown Driving Park Association and the Exhibition Association.

The decision was made at a meeting held on Saturday afternoon and brings an end to the many and varied reports circulating about Charlottetown to the effect that a new group would be taking over the season's racing program.

Mr. Kennedy also reported that the Old Home week would go on as scheduled and that a week-long program of racing would be presented together with the livestock show and other features of the week as has been the custom in other years.

The racing schedule opening at the Driving Park in mid-June, will follow the dates already released by Prince Edward Island's Sports Commission.

Annual Provincial Chess Tourney Slated Next Week

Some keen competition is expected in this year's playing. Johnnie MacInnis will be out to retain his championship but it is understood that a young lad, Peter MacNeill may make a difficult for anyone aspiring for this high honour.

Peter is a first year student at Prince of Wales College and has been playing the game for about five years. He received his first instruction in chess from his father, Everett MacNeill who has always been a strong contender in the annual contests.

Smith And Boomhower Win Island Badminton Titles

Rangy Earl Smith of Summerside won the Prince Edward Island badminton championship at Summerside Airport on Sunday by defeating Johnny Byrne of the Summerside R.C.A. in straight games in the best-two-of-three finals.

The veteran Smith had too much to offer for his youthful opponent and after coping the first game 15-9 coasted through to a 15-1 victory for the championship.

The match was re-scheduled for Summerside when time ran out on the tournament directors on Saturday night at Queen Charlotte High School. All other matches were played at the high school.

Byrne made the final round upsetting second-seeded Stan Lancaster in a hard-fought 3-game match.

Jennie Boomhower of Charlottetown won the ladies title in straight games over Wanda MacMillan and teamed with her lone singles opponent to win the ladies doubles and matched up with Walter Cullen to win the mixed doubles.

George Purvis and Paul Kays combined to come up with the biggest upset of the day by downing Smith and Cullen, 17-18, 15-9, 15-4 for the Island men's doubles crown. Third-seeded in the draw Purvis and Kays fought their way through an easy 15-5, 15-7 victory over Harold Power and Ray McCloskey and knocked out the top-seeded Stan Lancaster-Jim Johnston team in the semi-finals.

Purvis and Kays dropped the first game of the semi-finals to their opponents 10-15 but roared back to take the next two 15-10 and 15-11.

SMITH UNDEFEATED

Champion Smith went through the day-long tournament undefeated. Smith drew a bye into the second round and had a tough battle in beating Martin 15-12, 15-8.

In the semi-finals Smith defeated George Purvis 15-7, 15-3.

Byrne started his march from the first round beating Jack Hennessy 15-11, 15-9. He downed fellow airman Peter Cooper 15-12, 15-10.

Cullen was top-seeded in the mixed doubles and drew a bye into the second round. The combination went through the tournament without dropping a game.

The second-seeded team of Smith and Cullen made their way to the finals of the men's doubles by downing the airforce team of Goulet and Byrne 15-4, 15-9 and thrashing another airforce combination Peter Cooper and Ted Martin 15-7, 15-11 in the semi-finals.

The duo managed to win the first game of the final round from Purvis and Kays 17-18 but the Charlottetown team rallied to win the next two 15-4, 15-4.

POST HITS FOUR HOMERS

Score Hurls Three-Hitter But Loses, Pirates Win 2

Pittsburgh dumped Brooklyn out of the National League lead with a double defeat, the New York Giants' Ramon Monzant pitched a one-hitter and Cincinnati's Wally Post hit four home runs during a winning doubleheader with Chicago in Sunday's baseball features.

The big news in the American League, where half the clubs were washed out the three-hitter that Herb Score of Cleveland led to Detroit after striking out 13 batters. Bill Tuttle beat Score, 1-0, with a 10th inning home run.

The Pirates clobbered the Dodgers 10-1 and 11-3, thus dropping on a percentage basis. Milwaukee,

in his home debut and Billy Loes, the sorearmed righthander, failed to last two innings in the second game. Jack Shepard hit two homers and Frank Thomas and Law one each for the Pirates. Robinson and Roy Campanella homered for the Dodgers.

Monzant pitched a brilliant game after Del Ennis singled off shortstop Al Dark's glove in the first inning, driving in the Phill's lone run of the second game. The 23-year-old righthander from Venezuela, who had to be coaxed out of a threatened retirement during spring training, struck out nine men and retired 17 men in succession after walking Stan Lopata in the second.

COASTS TO 8-1 WIN

The Giants hopped on Curt Simmons and knocked him out in the first inning to give Monzant plenty of working margin. He coasted home 8-1.

Philadelphia took the first game 5-4 in the first major league homer by relief pitcher Jack Meyer in the 10th inning. Jack Meyer by George Wilson had tied the score for the Giants in the ninth. Richie Ashburn and Andy Seminick also homered for the Phils and Willie Mays for the Dodgers.

Post drove in eight runs in Cincinnati's double triumph over the Cubs, 5-4 and 8-4. His performance was only one short of the major league record of five by one player in a doubleheader, set by Ed Bailey and Frank Robinson joined Post in the homer parade and Harry Chiti, Ernie Banks and Jim King walloped home runs for Chicago.

CLEVELAND SHOWS POWER

Tuttle's homer and Billy Hoef's shutout pitching was about all Detroit had to cheer about. After the Detroit's opening 1-0 victory, Cleveland teed off on the Tiger for an 8-4 decision in the second game. Bob Lemon allowed seven hits and the Indians slammed five homers, two each by Al Smith and Vic Wertz and one by Hal Nara-gon.

Baltimore and Washington split a pair at Washington. The Orioles scored four in the seventh inning, including a two-run pinch homer by Tito Francona, for an 8-6 edge in the first game. Dick Tuttle-bach's single with the bases loaded gave Washington a 5-4 margin in the second.

The New York Yankee-Boston Red Sox game at Boston was called off because of wet grounds and a scheduled doubleheader, Kansas City at Chicago was rained out. As a result, the White Sox still hold first place by percentage points over the Yanks.

West Indies Selects Davis Cup Team To Meet Canada

PORT OF SPAIN, Trinidad (Reuters)—The West Indies Saturday night selected its four-man tennis team to meet Canada in Davis Cup matches starting here Thursday.

The four are: Ian McDonald of British Guiana, Peter Phillips of Jamaica, Ralph Legall of Trinidad and Peter Waddell of Trinidad. Jin Hean Ho, an ex-Davis Cup player from China, will be non-playing captain.

Legall is Trinidad's champion and is believed to be one of the best players in the West Indies. Although it is still unofficial it is pretty certain that McDonald and Phillip will play in the singles and Legall and Waddell in the doubles.

Last year in Canada, McDonald defeated Lorne Main of Toronto and Vancouver in five sets in the Davis Cup match when he was acting as captain of the West Indies. He also represented the West Indies in Davis Cup play in 1953. He played at Wimbledon in 1953-1954 and 1955 and represented Cambridge University from 1952 to 1955 when he was captain of their team.

SHORT OF PRACTICE

Phillips represented the West Indies in the Davis Cup play last year.

Legall, 31, the oldest player on the team, represented the West Indies in Davis Cup play against the U.S. in 1954.

Waddell, 25, is purely a doubles man with beautiful strokes and the best strategist in the West Indies.

The Canadian team here is short of practice, and team captain Robert Bedard of Sherbrooke, Quebec, No. 1 singles man, feels that the doubles are the key to victory.

If the weather is hot, he fears it may hurt Canada's chances. However, the last three days have been cool with intermittent showers.

Bedard and Henri Rochon of Montreal have practised every day with Don Fontana of Toronto since their arrival last Thursday. Fontana, who preceded them by two weeks, has put in a lot of work on the hard clay courts on which the match will be played.

Gene Littler Hits Jackpot

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP)—California's Gene Littler hit a second \$10,000 golfing jackpot Sunday when he won the \$38,500 Tournament of Champions in a rousing last round duel with Cary Middlecoff.

Littler, winning this event for the second straight year, fired a one under par 71 for a 72-hole score of 281 and four strokes back came Middlecoff after a gallant but losing struggle to catch and pass his 25-year-old rival.

Middlecoff fashioned a 70 for a total of 285 and \$4,000 prize money. Veteran Lloyd Mangrum slipped into third place. Worth \$2,200 with a last round 69 that gave him 288 as the erstwhile threat, young Gardner Dickinson Jr., helped himself to a whopping eight on the 15th hole and wound up down the line.

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Sun Deck Cops TV Race

NEW YORK (AP)—Two horses, running on tracks 3,000 miles apart, raced a mile against each other Sunday in the oddest match race in history.

It was all part of a stunt for the NBC television show Wide World of Sports.

At New York's Jamaica race track, jockey Eddie Arcaro rode Dan Giddings, a four-year-old, while at Hollywood Park jockey Willie Shoemaker was aboard Sun Deck, a five-year-old.

As the horses waited in the starting gates, starter Marshall Cassidy in New York pressed a button which opened both gate simultaneously.

Then, by the use of split screens, televisioners were able to watch the two horses.

Sun Deck, running on the much faster Hollywood course, won by a good margin.
