TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT

Summary of Proceedings.

OTTAWA, March 15.

Sir John Macdonald moved that for the rest of the session government business have precedence on Wednesday. He said that if the members wished for prorogation before Easter they would have to make short speeches, consent to long sittings and be animated with a sincere desire to return to their families.

Hon. Mr. Laurier objected to the Government taking this extra day when so much business promoted by private members remained to be done. Only Mondays would be left for other than Government business and he thought one day a week would be sufficient for this. Much as he would like to see prorogation before Easter, he thought the business should not be allowed to suffer.

Sir John Macdonald agreed with Mr. Laurier that important business should not be left undone to secure an early adjournment. In view of the opposition offered, he amended his motion so as to leave Wednesday next for private members, and to appropriate for Government measures the subsequent Wednesdays agreed to.

The bill to make further provisions respecting the Speedy Trials Act, was read a third time and passed; also the bill amending the act respecting certificates to masters and mates of ships. The bill to amend the Winding-up Act was read a second time, and adopted in committee.

Hon. John Haggart's bill respecting the appointment of post office inspectors without examination, and the increase of salaries to certain postmasters, and making other amendments to the Civil Service Act was read a second time, considered in committee and adopted.

House adjourned at 11 o'clock.

NOTES.

Mr. Jones, of Halifax, gives notice tonight to add the following to the fourth clause of the C. P. R. Bill after the word whatever: "After a sufficient amount of the proceeds of said consolidated stock has been reserved for the completion and equipment of the railway from Mattawankeg to Harvey and Salisbury in the province of New Brunswick."

Col. Bacon, head-quarters Staff-Secretary of the Rifle Association, has been appointed commander of the Wimbledon team, and Capt. Hood, of Montreal, adjutant. The condition of Hon. J. H. Pope is critical.

Sir Charles Wins.

OTTAWA, March 15.

At the Assizes Court to-day, the hearing of the case of Mrs. Bell vs. Sir Charles Tupper, was commenced. Mr. Gibb opened the case, and stated that the plaintiff was engaged by Sir Charles for the performance of certain detective duties, such as watching conductors on the Intercolonial railway. The defendant set up a general denial of this, and alleged that any work that was done was for the Department of Railways and Canals. But it would be proved that the plaintiff was not engaged by the Government, and that Sir Charles was personally liable. After evidence by Mrs. Bell, Sir Charles, and E. Brown, Mr. McCarthy made a powerful argument on behalf of Sir Charles Tupper, clearly showing the case to be one of blackmail. Judge McMahon charged the jury strongly on behalf of Sir Charles Tupper. The jury retired at 11 o'clock, and at midnight returned a verdict unanimously in favor of the defendant. The Judge, in recording the verdict, said he would seriously consider before morning whether or not to instruct the Crown prosecutor to indict Bell and his wife for perjury.

Great Moral Reform.

QUEBEC, March 15.

An important moral reform was introduced to-day. Yesterday afternoon the Assembly sat a short time with closed doors, but the result was not made known until to-day, when the Sergeant-at-Arms, armed with the Speaker's authority, proceeded to the liquor bar of the House and ordered it closed. The Opposition leader, Mr. Killon, complained of the demoralization caused by the bar, and asked that it should be closed, a stand in which he was warmly supported by a majority of both sides.

Central Bank Dividend.

TORONTO, March 15.

The Central Bank dividend of 20 per cent., payable on the 1st June, practically closes the liquidation. The master has awarded the liquidators another \$5,000, making \$220,000 in all to the end of last year.

Now 'Tis "Black Caps."

KINGSTON, Ont., March 15.

An organization, called the "Black Caps," has been formed here. The secretary is busy notifying riders to go to work and wife-beaters to mend their ways.

New Franchise Bill.

HALIFAX, March 15.

The Local Government introduced the new Franchise Bill to-day. It extends the franchise to males with \$900 income, and makes the Sheriffs Revising Officers.

Miner Killed.

HALIFAX, March 15.

Edward Hall was killed in the Victoria coal mine, at Cape Breton, on Wednesday.

TORONTO, March 15.

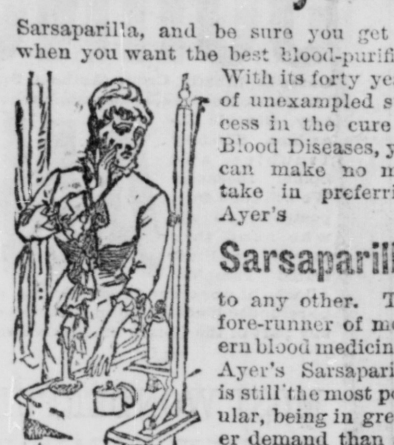

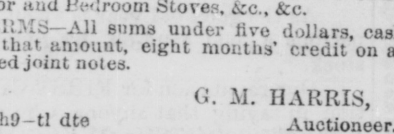
