## Playoff Set For Colleges

ANTIONISH, N.S. (CP)—Dr. Gerald Russell, president of the Maritime Intercollegiate Athletic Union, said Thursday plans have been completed for a national university hockey playoff series to be held in Kingston, Ont. next March.

Dr. Russell, a member of the faculty of St. Francis Xavier University, recently returned from meetings of the Canadian Intercollegiate Athletic Union. He said the hockey playoff will involve winners of the Western, Maritime, Ontario-Quebec and Ottawa-St. Lawrence branches of the CIAU.

A round-robin basketball tournament involving representative teams of the same branches is also planned for March. A site has yet to be chosen.

Dr. Russell said officers of the expanded CIAU body also hoped a national intercollegiate football playoff may be arranged for 1963.

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
