GEORGE HAMPSON GREEN

George Hampson Green of Kingston, Prince Edward Island, passed away very unexpectedly while attending the funeral services for his brother, the late William Green, January 26th, 1951.

Having recovered from a severe illness, Mr. Green was considered restored to his usual good health, but was stricken with a severe heart attack from which he failed to rally.

Mr. Green was born at Glasgow Road, P.E.I., on August 8th, 1878. He moved to Kingston with his parents in 1888 where he resided until his death. His wife predeceased him in June 1948.

He leaves to mourn his passing three daughters (May, Mrs. Clifford Proud, Hampshire, (Elizabeth), Mrs. Earl Ward, Hampshire, (Florence), Mrs. Gordon Jewell, North River, and one son Harrison who reside at Kingston.

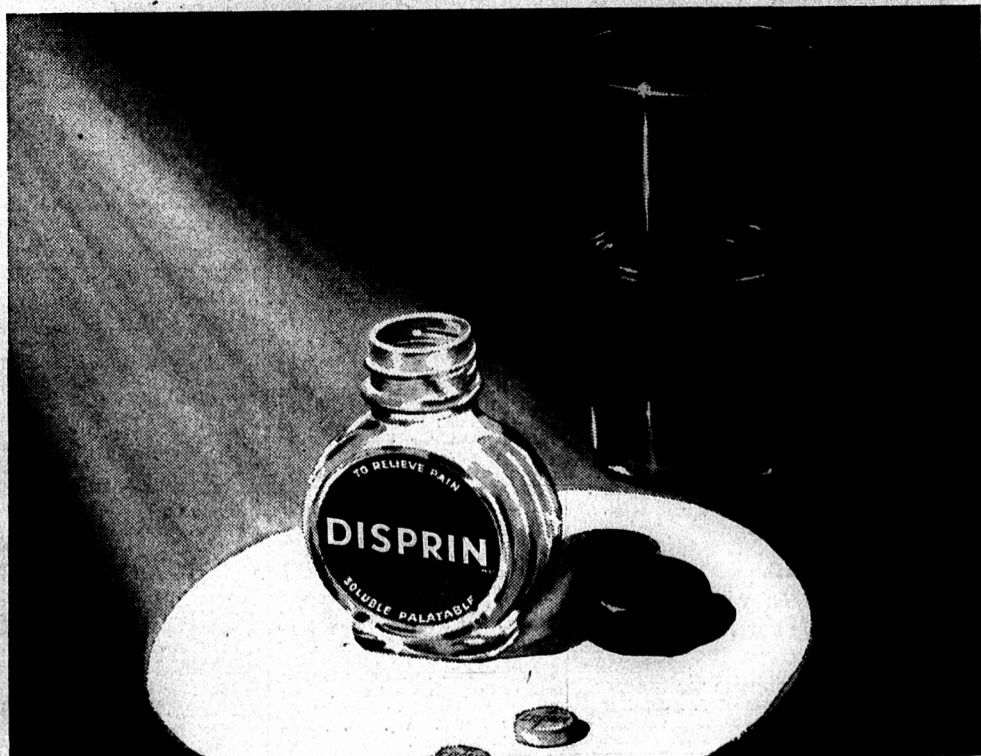
