Flash Fire At Service Station Cause Damage

A flash fire broke out at Brookview Service Station, Montague, yesterday morning, when a bucket of gas exploded spreading flames throughout the interior of the workshop. Ceiling and walls were quickly enveloped in a mass of flames and employees moved rapidly to push out a truck in the danger area. They then ran for the water hose, and despite the terrific heat were able to reduce the fire to a small area and were finally able to extinguish it.

The Montague Fire Department answered the alarm as quickly as possible, and were on hand to assist in any further outbreak. Damage to the interior was considerable and will require a new interior resurfacing job.

1. Do not approach within 200 yards of a fire truck.
2. Should you find yourself in front of a fire truck, park your vehicle at the side of the street as quickly as possible.
3. Do not park within 200 yards of the fire, and do not double park.
4. Remember the town speed limit is 20 M.P.H.
5. Refrain from calling the telephone operator; leave the circuits free for the use of firemen, if necessary.

The Polio Season For P. E. I. Is Mid-August to Mid-October

Mid-August to mid-October is usually the worst season for polio in P. E. I., although cases may occur much earlier or later. So far, there have been very few cases this year.

The viruses which cause polio usually enter the body by way of the mouth through contact with infectious discharges from nose, mouth and bowels.

Even before symptoms of polio appear, the viruses multiply chiefly in the intestinal tract and are also found in the sputum and discharges from the nose.

KEEP CLEAN
Strict cleanliness is essential in preventing polio. Hands should be washed frequently and always before eating and handling food and after going to the toilet.

Cover coughs and sneezes with disposable tissues. Teach children not to share cups, lolly pops, fruit, etc., with others.

Keep toilets and privies clean and fly proof. Keep constant control of flies and insects. Cover garbage in tightly covered containers. Dispose of it frequently.

OTHER PROTECTIVE MEASURES
1. Avoid going places where polio cases have been reported in large numbers. Avoid contacts in buses, trains and crowds. Keep children with their own friends.

2. Avoid overfatigue. Too active play, late hours, worry, irregular schedule may invite serious disease.

3. Avoid chilling. Take off wet clothes and shoes at once. Do not play around in wet bathing suit.

IF SYMPTOMS DEVELOP
Go to bed. This is important. Call the doctor.

Keep away from others until a diagnosis is made. Symptoms of polio are: headache, fever, sore throat, nausea, upset stomach, irritability or drowsiness, tired feeling, stiff neck, stiff back. May be mistaken for "summer flu".
