MONTREAL, (CP)—Net profit of Anglo-Canadian Pulp and Paper Mills, Limited, and its subsidiaries increased in 1953 to \$3,396,761 from \$2,152,554 in 1952, the company's annual report showed Thursday.
Net profit was equal to \$2.69 a share in 1953, during which 212,858 shares of Dryden Paper Co. were acquired. The previous year the net profit a share was equal to \$2.05.
Working capital at the fiscal year-end stood at \$10,339,236 compared with \$9,632,898 the previous year.
