SHIFTING KEY MEN

St. Louis Cardinals Are Most Improved In Loop

 ST. PETERSBURG, Fla. (AP) — The gossip around major league baseball camps this spring is that St. Louis Cardinals are the most improved team in the National League. While Brooklyn and Milwaukee have been standing pat and Cincinnati making only one major move, the Cards have continued to shift key men hither and yon.

A year ago the league waited anxiously for general manager Frank Lane to start the wild trading that marked him the "David Harum" of the American League when he was at Chicago. They didn't have to wait long. Soon St. Louis fans were moaning about the departure of local heroes such as Harvey Haddix, Bill Virdon, Red Schoendienst and the promising young Jackie Brandt.

When that dust settled the Cardinals had moved from seventh place to fourth although still a staggering 17 games off the pace. Lane and manager Freddie Hutchinson had made impressive gains in their first year.

Trading continues

Although Lane's ears still burned from criticism when Virdon, traded to Pittsburgh, hit 319 to 214 by Bobby Del Greco who came from Pittsburgh to St. Louis as a centre field replacement, he made still more moves.

In early December, Tom Poholnsky, Jackie Collum and Ray Katt shuffled off to Chicago Cubs for Sam Jones, Jim Davis, Hobie Landrith and Eddie Miksis. Later

he sent Rip Repuski and Bobby Morgan to Philadelphia for Del Ennis, the righthanded long ball who had been searching for a year. Recently he picked up Hoyt Wilhelm from New York for his bullpen in exchange for first baseman Whitey Lockman.

Chuck Harmon, who hit .360 at Omaha after he came to St. Louis from Cincinnati, has been getting a chance to take the centre job. Del Greco must pick up on his hitting to beat out Harmon.

Smith (.282), a winter sensation in Havana, is the No. 1 catcher with the left handed hitting Landrith (.221 at Chicago) to help.

Lindsay Equals One Record And Nears Another

MONTREAL (CP)—Ted Lindsay of Detroit Red Wings has equalled a National Hockey League record and is close to another.

The league's official statistics, released Tuesday, show Lindsay with 82 points, made up of 28 goals and 54 assists. Lindsay's mark ties the record 82 points for a left-winger made by Herbie Cain of the Boston Bruins in the 1943-44 season. Cain amassed 36 goals and 46 assists when NHL teams played a 50-game schedule compared with the present 70.

Lindsay's team has three games left in which he will have a chance to beat Cain's long-standing record.

Lindsay's 54 assists put him within two of the record 56 for a player at any position. Lindsay's old record of 53 was eclipsed by Bert Olmstead of Montreal Canadiens—a left-winger—last season.

Doug Harvey of Montreal is within one assist of his own record of 43 assists for a defenceman. He has 42 with two games to play. He counted his record 43 in the 1954-55 season.

Rookies Power Yankees To 6-5 Victory Over Milwaukee

 A couple of rookies from Denver, Woody Held and Marv Throneberry, ignited a ninth-inning rally for the New York Yankees Tuesday and veteran Gil McDougald slapped a two-run double as the Bronx Bombers defeated the Milwaukee Braves 6-5.

It was the fourth straight exhibition victory and seventh in 11 games for New York, played before a crowd of 4,338—second largest ever to see a game at Bradenton, Fla.

Milwaukee had taken an early lead off Bob Turley, but Mickey Mantle homered in the fifth with one aboard and Held rapped a two-run homer in the sixth.

Held singled off loser Gene Conley, who worked the last four innings, in the ninth. Throneberry lashed a pinch double as hitter for Tommy Byrne, and McDougald brought both home.

Dick Stuart, who slammed 66 homers in the Western League last year, hit a pair of homers in the Pittsburgh Pirates defeated the Chicago White Sox 9-3 at Tampa, Fla.

The New York Giants came from behind to down the Chicago Cubs 9-4 at Mesa, Ariz. Bob Lemon sparked a four-run Giant rally in the fourth with a three-run homer.
