It is very desirable that all who have subscribed to the funds of the Hospital should be in punctual attendance.

It is reported that some changes are likely to occur in the staff of the I. C. R. at Moncton, presumably in consequence of the retirement of Mr. Luther B. Archibald from the position of superintendent of the Thunder Bay division of the C. P. R. Mr. James Coleman, superintendent of the P. E. Island road, who was on his way to St. John to attend the exhibition, was summoned to Montreal on Friday night last, to meet Mr. Schreiber there. Mr. D. Pottinger, the chief superintendent, and Mr. Geo. Taylor, general freight agent, were also sent for and they are now there.

A FIRE broke out in Simm's Brush Factory, on Monday night, and before it could be got under control, the whole building was burnt to the ground. The building was occupied by Messrs. T. S. Simm & Co., brush manufacturers; Messrs. Stewart & White, as a furniture factory; Mr. William Logan as a soap factory, and Mrs. Peters & Sutherland, boot and shoes. The building was a large one, and some 100x50 feet, and so accommodated all these tenants. The fire is a most serious one, the financial loss to the individual proprietors the loss being heavy in every instance. T. S. Simm's estimated at about \$65,000; T. S. Simm & Co. had \$12,000 on their stock; The Commercial Union Fire Insurance Company had \$5,000 on Mr. Simm's, and \$2,000 on the building, in behalf of Wm. Logan, and \$1,000 for Stewart & White.

THE third annual session of the Provincial Educational Institute Association, closed last evening, with a Literary and Musical Entertainment; but the real work of the session was over, after the afternoon Meeting. Yesterday morning, Professor Mellich had an interesting and valuable paper on "Thoroughness in the Work of Education, a Necessity of our Country." His remarks were listened to with great attention. The afternoon session was opened with an amusing and instructive paper on "Human Respect," by Dominian Gallant Esq. Mr. Gallant made some good points, which deserve the earnest consideration of those who had the pleasure of hearing him. At eight o'clock p. m., the entertainment opened with an Instrumental Solo, by Miss M. McLeod, followed by Mr. Gallant, who repeated his essay of the afternoon. Miss Harris' Solo was very pretty and very nicely sung. A song from Mrs. Gaul is always a pleasing part of a programme. Miss McLeod and Miss Barr delighted the audience with a vocal Duet, which was perhaps the best feature of the whole entertainment. It being Miss Fennessy's first appearance as a performer she lacked the confidence and consequently we think she hardly did herself justice. The readings were, with but one or two exceptions, not up to the mark. Not only were the selections, as a rule, poor, but the readers themselves helped to make them worse. But as was said above, there were a few exceptions, among whom were Miss H. Lawson, Mr. E. Harris, and one or two others. Miss Lawson, however, did not read as well as usual, owing, doubtless, to the fact that she had but little time to make preparation. Mr. Harris read an Irish sketch, entitled "A Trip to the moon," and certainly he read it well. The piece was irresistibly comic and Mr. Harris did it ample justice. He has a good strong voice, and unlike many of those who took part in the entertainment, he had plenty confidence in himself. We must not forget to mention that Mr. Gallant favored the audience with a very pretty French song.

**The Signal Station at Point Barrow.**

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Oct. 10. Lieut. Ray, who left here in July, 1881, under instructions of the Signal Service Bureau, to establish a permanent signal service station at point Barrow, returned here on Sunday, by order of the department. Since the station was established two years ago, fifty lives were saved, and the order to return has created great surprise.

**A Serious Railway Accident.**

OTTAWA, Oct. 10. A serious accident occurred on the Canada Pacific Railway near Mattawa, last night. An axle of a passenger car broke, throwing four others off the track and down an embankment. About twenty passengers were badly injured, and the company's loss is about \$30,000.

**Royal Favor.**

BERLIN, Oct. 10. Emperor William has sent to Von Schilling, sculptor of the Niederwald monument, an autograph letter conferring upon the artist the decoration of honor, and enclosing a gift amounting to thirty thousand marks.

**The Franco-Spanish Difficulty.**

MADRID, Oct. 10. The public is impatient for the settlement of the difficulty between France and Spain. Senor Sagnova will probably reconstruct his Cabinet the present week.

**In Favor of Gen. Iglesias.**

LIMA, Oct. 10. Caama, the principal sea port in the department of Ancacha, has declared in favor of Gen. Iglesias and peace.

**Yellow Fever Spreading.**

WASHINGTON, Oct. 10. Yellow fever is still raging in Mexico, and is said to be travelling northward up the Californian Gulf.

**Fire in Memphis.**

MEMPHIS, Oct. 10. An extensive fire on Union Street last night caused a loss of \$112,000.
