

# Souris Man Acquitted On Negligence Charge



PERCY DANIEL DUNPHY OF SOURIS WAS NOT GUILTY OF CRIMINAL NEGLIGENCE IN THE DEATH OF GEORGE ANTHONY LONGAPHE OF SOURIS LINE ROAD.

GEORGETOWN — Percy Daniel Dunphy of Souris was not guilty of criminal negligence in the death of George Anthony Longaphe of Souris Line Road.

The verdict was reached yesterday by a petit jury at the November sitting of the Supreme Court with Mr. Justice R.R. Bell presiding.

Longaphe died June 16 in the Charlottetown Hospital as a result of injuries received in a car accident June 7 at the intersection of the Souris Line Road and St. Catherine's Road. Longaphe was a passenger in a car driven by Dunphy.

The crown was represented by Deputy Attorney General J. Arthur McQuaid, Q.C. and the accused, Percy Daniel Dunphy, all of Souris.

The trial was held at the court house in Charlottetown.

Mr. McQuaid made an application to the court asking the judge to bring in a verdict of not guilty by reason that the crown had not established the death of George Anthony Longaphe, as no decisive evidence had been given that to their knowledge, the man that had died was Longaphe. The application was denied.

The defense then put on witnesses Mrs. Mary Dunphy, Gertrude Savoy, Leonard O'Hanley, and the accused, Percy Daniel Dunphy, all of Souris.

During the course of the trial the crown called 20 witnesses and the defense five. The court was adjourned until Dec. 1.

# Three Hunters Charged For Using Live Decoys

George Aberdeen Smith, David Preston Smith, both of Fairview and William Andrew Keis, Sherwood, all charged with hunting migratory birds using live birds as decoys, each had their cases adjourned for trial to Nov. 27 in Queens County Magistrate's Court yesterday before Magistrate James B. Johnston, Q.C.

Donald I. MacLean of Rocky Point was convicted on a charge of driving while impaired and was fined \$100 and costs or 10 days. He had pleaded not guilty to the charge of driving while intoxicated.

Donald Allan Yunker of Southport pleaded guilty to a charge of theft of three gallons of latex paint and to theft of 10 gallons of gasoline and had his case adjourned to Nov. 12.

Ernest Frederick Jewell of North River, charged with unlawful possession of a 1958 Ford, the property of Ellsford Motors, Parkdale, while knowing it was obtained by an offense punishable by indictment had his case adjourned to Nov. 16.

Herbert Charles Gallant of North Rustico pleaded guilty to a charge of causing wilful damage to the North Rustico War Memorial by putting 5 1/2 c a point on it and had his case adjourned to Nov. 13 for sentence.

Five persons were each fined \$30 and costs or 30 days when they pleaded guilty to charges of illegal possession of liquor.
