**NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.**

"HE WON AS HE LIKED."

LONDON, June 16.

The great boat race between Elliott, the English champion, and the Canadian, Hanlan, which came off to-day at about noon (English time), was won by Hanlan—the despatch stating that "Hanlan won as he liked." The difference in time enables us to get the information here about 9 o'clock this morning. This race constitutes the Canadian champion of the world. The odds were greatly in favor of the Canadian—a despatch stating that at the Newcastle Club, on Saturday, 11 to 4 on Hanlan was laid five times, and offers of 100 to 40 found no takers. Hanlan will return home immediately.

A correspondent of the *Sportsman* interviewed both Hanlan and Elliott on Saturday. Both expressed themselves very confident. They did only a very moderate amount of work on Saturday, and on Sunday merely enough to keep their hands in. Hanlan, on Saturday, had a few short shorts spurts with Plaisted at the rate of 35 to 36 strokes to the minute. He made the boat travel splendidly. Hanlan's muscles are superbly developed and he attains rare speed with little apparent effort. Elliott also rowed 36 strokes per minute in a finished style.

On Saturday Hanlan, when paddling down the river, sighted Elliott, and immediately turned and both rowed leisurely in the direction of Scotswood, having about 150 yards distance between them.

The "Sportsman" says Elliott declares he never had been so thoroughly trained before.

Hanlan, too, was in excellent condition.

The despatch adds:—

"We expect to see a most exciting struggle for a good part of the distance, when probably Elliott will tire from fatigue, caused by the long slide to which he is unaccustomed, and Hanlan will draw ahead."

This has probably been the case, as Hanlan "won as he liked."

SOUTH AMERICA.

NEW YORK, June 15.

News has been received that the Pacific mail steamer "Acupolca" has been prevented from landing at Aspinwall. She carried war munitions consigned to Peruvian houses. The Chilean Government has protested against the passage of arms across neutral territory.

GERMANY.

BERLIN, June 15.

In the debate in the Reichstag on the Samona Treaty, Von Kussow declared that Germany had no intention of forming colonies. He expressed his approval of the project of a steamer line between Polynesia, China and Germany, and announced the impending conclusion of a Treaty with the Sandwich Islands on the most favored national basis.

RUSSIA.

ST. PETERSBURG, June 15.

An Imperial order has been issued authorizing sentries to carry loaded and half calked repeating rifles.

TURKEY.

CONSTANTINOPLE, June 14.

The Khedive has instructed his agent to inform the Porte that Germany's accusation that he had violated his treaty obligations, is unfounded, and that he intends to maintain the best relations with the powers.

UNITED STATES.

WASHINGTON, June 14.

A bill has passed the House permitting any telegraph company to land ocean cables on the coasts of the United States without obtaining special legislation for such purpose.

NEW YORK, June 14.

The fire among the oil wells at Point Breeze, in Philadelphia, broke out afresh yesterday, and the remainder of the wharf, a half a mile in length—a quarter of which was burned on Wednesday—was destroyed, with a large amount of oil of the Atlantic Petroleum Storage Co. Loss \$150,000.

It was announced in New York, yesterday, that the whole of the capital of the proposed new Central Union Telegraph Company has been subscribed, and offers for twice the amount received. All the Dominion Company's lines have been purchased, and in three months it is claimed six thousand miles of first-class wire will be in operation to Boston and the principal cities south and west.

A Cincinnati, O., despatch says: Destructive storms have passed over southern Ohio and portions of Indiana and Kentucky, damaging the crops, fences, &c. Lightning struck many dwellings. In Salem, the residence of David Mitchell, and the Railway depot, in Christianburg, Ky., were completely demolished, and 200 trees were uprooted. Lightning struck the house of John Hamilton, of Madison, Ind., seriously injuring the inmates.

A negro horse thief was burned to death in a log jail at Columbus, Ky. It is believed he fired the jail to effect escape. Vain efforts were made to save him.

NEW YORK, June 16.

A destructive storm swept over this city this p. m., doing considerable damage.

Houses were unroofed, windows smashed in, and trees blown down. The steamers "Thomas Collyer" and "Twilight" collided in North River to-night. The "Twilight" had about 800 excursionists on board but no lives are reported lost.

THE ELECTRIC LIGHT.

LONDON, June 14.

The Parliamentary Committee has reported that the electric lighting system has sufficiently developed to allow of its being economically used for public, but not for domestic purposes.

Mr. Barnum on Temperance and Intemperance.

A GREAT SHOWMAN AND A STAUNCH TETOTALLER OF THIRTY-TWO YEARS STANDING.

The Hon. P. T. Barnum, of world-wide fame as the greatest showman on earth, is also a pledged teetotaler and goes into the subject of Temperance, and sets forth the evils intemperance as thoroughly as he would act in the case of any of his other engagements. It was not known until the meeting had assembled in the Hall on Steadman street yesterday afternoon, that Mr. Barnum would be present or address the meeting, otherwise a larger hall would have been obtained, to accommodate the crowd which would have gathered. As the circumstances were, the hall was not greatly overcrowded. The meeting opened with the usual exercises,—singing, prayer and reading the scriptures,—Mr. W. J. Robinson presiding.

Mr. Barnum having been called on by the Rev. Mr. Kinnie, said he had been unexpectedly invited to speak, but as for 32 years he had been a teetotaler and could not conscientiously say "no" to an appeal to speak or do anything else for the forwarding of the principles of total abstinence, he therefore said "yes." The longer I live, said the veteran showman in great earnestness, the more I believe in the words "Love God, and love man." He said we could not act up to this in any better way than by being temperate and helping others to be so. We should remember that anything we did which would help along one individual, would help all mankind. He himself knew the effects of drinking intoxicating liquors, for until 1847 he had been a drinking man. Therefore he could speak as one having experience. He knew what he had been previous to 1847, and he knew what he was when he left off the habit, and he could only truly attribute his vigor and vim at 69 years of age to the fact that he had drunk cold water for the last 32 years of his life. Intemperance was a giant evil,—the greatest curse of civilization,—the father of most other evils,—and he knew it from his own experience. The speaker here related an anecdote he had heard Father Matthew tell of an Irishman who, when given his choice of three crimes to commit,—murder, arson or to get drunk, said he could not commit murder, as he had not the heart to injure his fellow man; he could not fire his neighbor's buildings, as much damage and loss of life must follow; but as he had to do one of the three evils, he would get drunk. And while in a state of intoxication, the man committed both the crimes he had refused to while in his sober senses. Mr. Barnum said this might be true, as it was unquestionable that more than seven-eighths of all crime was the outgrowth of rum drinking. He asked the audience to consider how this land would flourish and blossom as the rose, figuratively speaking, if these seven-eighths would all become industrious and good citizens.

Sir William Thomson, the eminent scientist, has done good service in directing the world's attention to the uses to which the Niagara Falls could be put. It is estimated that the force represented by the principal fall alone is equal to 16,800,000 horse-power, which to be produced by steam would necessitate the consumption of over 250,000,000 tons of coal, equal to the annual production of all the mines in the universe. It is astounding to think of the enormous creative power which nature has here placed at our service, but which is allowed to run to waste.—*Toronto Mail*.

SUICIDE.—Alberta, aged 15, daughter of Mr. Thomas Tingley, of Midgie, Westmorland, hanged herself in her father's barn on Wednesday. No cause is assigned for the act.—*Amherst Gazette*.
