ON THE HOCKEY ICE.

Crystals Victorious 6-3. Second Victorias Secure Intermediate Match—5-2

The hockey last night was of a most interesting character. Although the senior Victorias were beaten they cannot be classed lower than their rivals, for the ice being in such a wretched condition a just judgment is impossible. The Crystals had the advantage in weight, and did not fail to benefit by it. They were fully as active as the Victorias, with the exception of H. Brehaut. Body checking was rather severe at times, and a considerable amount of slashing was preferred. The game was not very fast, owing directly to the ice, but at times hockey must as fast as any witnessed here took place. The aggressive play of the Crystals left nothing to be desired, and it can be said with justice that in this respect they were superior to the home team. Their defence was admirable, Compton at cover point being irreplaceable, Maclean and Sprague played excellently, and their rushes down the ice were splendid. Grady was decidedly the best forward of the Crystals. Saunders played with his old-time prowess. The game throughout seemed to be a trial for supremacy in individual play; but combination work was not forgotten. The visitors used it more than their opponents. It was not till 8.30 that play began. McArthur beat Brehaut on the face and soon the fight waged in the Victoria's ice. A few minutes elapsed and a goal was scored by Grady. The second game was faster than the first, and H. Brehaut scored a goal. The third goal was made by Baker after a pretty maneuver with Grady. The Crystals scored twice more in this half, while the Victorias remained as they were. Score 4-1.

The second half was not faster than the first. Weeks played a fine game in this half and secured a goal for his side. Brehaut with a well directed shot secured one more goal and the last for the Victorias. The Crystals made two goals in rapid succession by Grady and Baker. The slack defence of the Victorias at this point of the game contributed largely to these two goals. Score 6-3. Time came without any more scoring.

The Intermediate match developed some interesting facts. The Victorias were vastly superior to the Stars in all points. Last night they ran away with them. The forwards of the Stars played a fine game, but the work of the Victorias in attack was irresistible. Some roughness was indulged in, and Adams and Davy each adorned the boards. The latter played a great game at cover-point. There was a great deal of long distance playing, and the exchange of courtesies by Morris and Davy a some points of the game left little for the others. 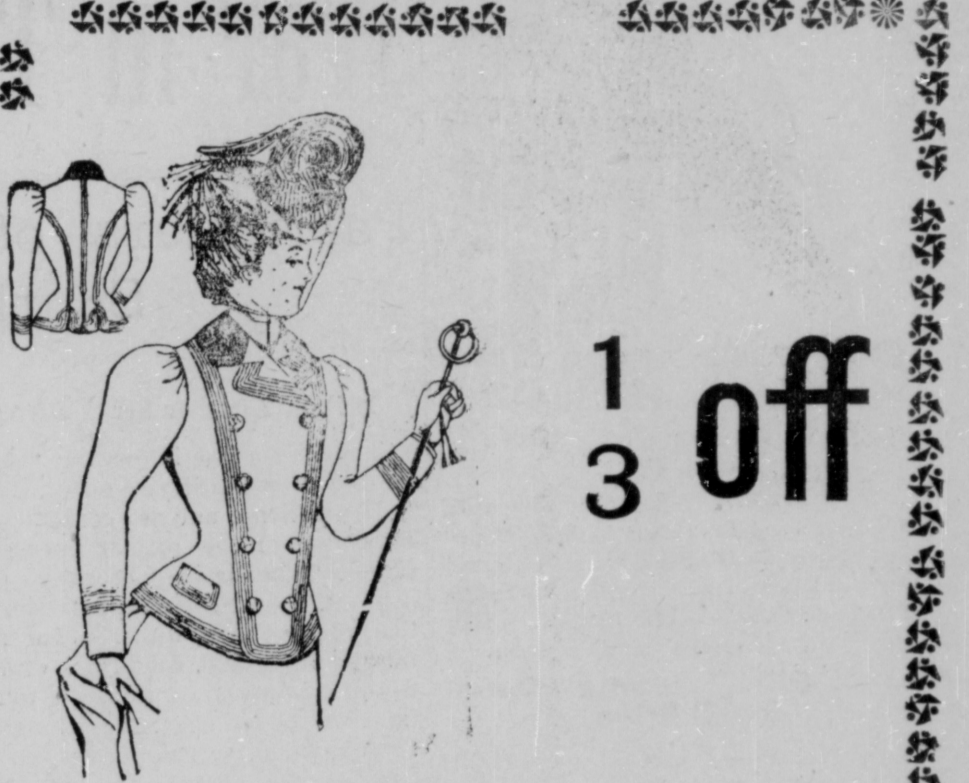
