Violence quickly spread throughout the country, and a number of persons were reported killed by gunfire in Brazil's big southern city of Porto Alegre.

The suicide of Brazil's 71-year-old strong man was an explosive climax to the two-week-long crisis over the murder of an air force major during an attempted assassination of an anti-Vargas newspaper editor.
