

Islanders Hold First Workout This Season

Murph Chamberlain, the Hardrock from Shawville, working without the benefit of a night's sleep and on a borrowed pair of skates, put a half dozen potential Islanders through a skating and puck carrying drill last night at the Forum in the first official hockey practise of the season.

Looking fit as a fiddle and just back from his home in Winnipeg was left winger Jimmy MacKenzie who came almost directly from the station to the Forum for the practise.

Also working out were Buck Whitlock, Ray Marshall, Bubby Dowling, Bob Gray, Larry Travis, Billy Purcell and Frank Roper.

Checking in at the Forum during the practise were Hub Beaudry and George McLagan who arrived here on the evening train. Both boys have two weeks of hockey and six games under their belts having gone through the training grind at the Providence Reds camp in Grand-Mere, Quebec.

Chamberlain due here early yesterday morning, did not arrive until the afternoon when his plane was delayed in Montreal. Originally slated to leave Montreal around midnight his plane did not check out until five in the morning and in the mix-up Murph arrived without his luggage and hockey equipment.

Expected to arrive here today by car are Wimpy Stevenson, 200 pound defenceman from Rose-town, Sask. Lou Kielley and Crusher Kelly, Orin Gould of St. Catharines in due time Friday.

Six or seven forwards and a number of defencemen are expected to arrive around the first of the week. It was learned from Murph. These men are in training camps in Quebec and Ontario and their names will not be released until they are released from these camps.

With regards to the goaltending problem Murph hopes to have it solved within the next twenty-four hours. The goalie is presently in the camp of a professional club and is reputed to be a capable performer.

Phil Vitale, Islanders rearguard for the past two seasons will likely be playing in Valleyfield this year. The Islanders will obtain two players in exchange for him.

The Islanders will hold another workout at ten o'clock this morning.

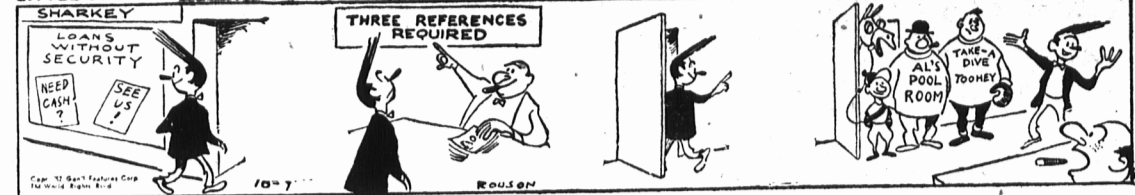
Charles Wins From Reynolds

Tommy Holmes Signs As Manager

NEW YORK, Oct. 8—(AP)—Brooklyn-born Tommy Holmes, who got into his second World Series this year as a result of being fired as manager of the Boston Braves, returned to the Boston organization and to managing today.

Holmes signed as manager of the Braves' American Association farm club, the Milwaukee Brewers, after the Braves obtained Brooklyn's permission to negotiate with him.

Bucky Walters, who asked to return to Boston as coach after finishing the season as manager and piloting the Brewers to the American Association pennant. They lost out in the playoffs to Kansas City.

Alberton Man Heads P. E. I. Curling Ass'n

Herbert Matthews of Alberton was elected President of the Prince Edward Island Curling Association last night at the annual meeting of the Association in Charlottetown. He succeeds Reg. Ellis of Summerside who presided at the early part of last night's meeting.

The presidents of each of the Charlottetown, Summerside, Alberton and Montague Curling clubs were elected vice-presidents of the Association while Finley MacLeod of Charlottetown was re-elected secretary.

Members from the Charlottetown, Summerside and Alberton Clubs attended the meeting which featured a discussion on the number of teams which should be allowed to play for the British Consols Trophy.

It was moved by Dr. Wendall MacDonald that a total of eight teams should be permitted to enter the competition with each of the four member clubs having the right to enter two teams.

However should Montague and Alberton only wish to enter one team both the Charlottetown and Summerside clubs will enter three teams to ensure that eight teams are competing for the trophy.

In the event that Montague and Alberton do not enter any teams Charlottetown and Summerside will send four teams each.

It was moved that the clubs notify the secretary of their intentions one week before the bonspiel started. It was also decided that a double knock-out system of play should be used with the playdowns being part of the Confederation Bonspiel.

The British Consols play this winter will be held on the week of February 9th at Charlottetown. The discussion on the British Consols Trophy play was led by Chief Justice Thane A. Campbell and Dr. Wendall MacDonald.
