Mitchell also was sentenced to six months for having escaped from his police guard in hospital while being treated for a stomach ulcer.

Word has been received by the Prince Edward Island Potato Marketing Board from the Department of Trade and Commerce, Ottawa, of two fairly large prospective orders for certified seed potatoes for South America. The Argentine Republic is in the market for some 13,250 metric tons.

First Atlantic Hurricane Of Season Reported

MIAMI, Florida, (AP)—The year's first hurricane formed in the Atlantic Ocean off the Florida east coast Wednesday and began moving slowly northward in the direction of the Carolinas. Northeast storm warnings were hoisted on the Atlantic coast from Myrtle Beach, S.C., to Cape Hatteras, N.S. The Miami Weather Bureau said winds would begin to increase on the Carolinian coast late Wednesday night and reach gale force on the North Carolina coast tonight.

Expect Little Business At Meeting Of Cabinet

OTTAWA, (CP)—The cabinet meets today in its first post-election meeting, but indications are that it will not do much more than hold an informal election post-mortem and dispose of routine business. Though the agenda has been getting longer as the ministers campaign for weeks, most are anxious to take holidays, and they may do this after getting through the most pressing business in the morning. Prime Minister St. Laurent, who brought 171 Liberals back into the Commons Monday, is planning to catch an afternoon train for his summer home near Quebec for a holiday of a few weeks. Million Workers On Strike; More To Quit Today

PARIS, (AP)—France pressed policemen, soldiers and convicts into service Wednesday to deliver letters, drive buses and collect rubbish. A million workers were on strike. Two million more are expected to swell the week-old protest against economy decrees of premier Joseph Laniel in a 24-hour walkout today. The workers are up in arms over Laniel's program to pare the government's payroll of surplus civil servants and effect more economies by juggling with the age of retirement—a sensitive subject in security-conscious France. Publication Monday of the first 19 of his economy decrees gave the impetus to a new wave of walkouts in the wake of some which had been called in anticipation of his decision.

Strikes Cripple Services

Strikes are crippling gas and electric supplies, railroads, coal mines, shipping, the health services, subway and municipal bus systems and postal, telegraph and telephone services. Air France planes, lacking service crews, did not make some flights Wednesday. The new strikes have been called in metal-working industries, government offices, banks, insurance companies, business enterprises, social security and in the liberal professions.

VINELAND, Ont., (CP)—Two high school boys have travelled 3,600 miles on \$15 by hitchhiking and sleeping where they could. They returned Tuesday to this Niagara district community after a two-week trip to Texas, Louisiana and other southern points.

Chased Off Fishing Grounds By Monster

HALIFAX, (CP)—Fishermen at nearby West Dover were chased off their fishing grounds Monday by a fish described as being 30 feet long with a yellow head and grey body. None of the boats were hit by the plunging sea monster, second to appear in Nova Scotia waters this summer. A huge man-eating shark rammed a boat off Porcupa last month, and the fisherman occupant was drowned. West Dover fishermen went to their fishing grounds off Halifax today armed with rifles. Strange fish have also been reported by Newfoundland and Prince Edward Island fishermen. Fisheries officials claim tropical fish may be coming north because the Atlantic is becoming warmer. Last week 10-year-old Alex Finlayson of Sydney speared a charging 60-pound ray while fishing in St. Ann's Bay. Such fish usually inhabit tropical waters. The boy was presented with a gold medal for bravery later at the Gaelic mod at St. Ann's.

North Winsloe Man Dies After Accident On Road

Mr. Sheldon MacQuarrie, 27 of North Winsloe succumbed yesterday to internal injuries he received on Tuesday night when a half-ton G.M.C. truck he was driving reportedly went out of control near Harrington on the Brackley Point Road. He was alone at the time of the accident and the only reports come from motorists who were some distance behind him when his truck swerved and rolled over throwing Mr. MacQuarrie where he was found lying on the road. A bus driver reported seeing the lights of a vehicle approaching him from the rear, as if to pass, and then suddenly disappearing. The injured man was taken to the Prince Edward Island Hospital where he passed away at about 3 o'clock Wednesday afternoon. Coroner Prowse who performed an autopsy, ordered an inquest to be held at 10 o'clock this morning. Mr. MacQuarrie who was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Bruce MacQuarrie of North Winsloe was unmarried. He leaves three sisters, Grace and Inez at home and Mrs. William Wheatley of Charlottetown.

Two Defeated Red Candidates Are Arrested

OTTAWA, (CP)—Two defeated Labor Progressive (Communist) candidates in Monday's general election were remanded to Sept. 2 in police court Wednesday for formal commitment on charges of breaking into the Rockcliffe emergency shelter July 15. The pair, Ernest Gervais, 38, and Daniel Nerenberg, 31, pleaded innocent to the charges and elected trial by judge and jury. Gervais was arrested in Hull, and Nerenberg in Ottawa West. Gervais and Nerenberg were arrested after a padlock had been forced on a door to an apartment at the emergency shelter to allow a homeless family to enter the quarters.

Crisis Mounts In Pakistan

KARACHI, Pakistan (Reuters)—A crisis atmosphere mounted in Pakistan Wednesday night in the wake of hot-blooded demonstrations against the removal of Sheikh Abdullah as premier of neighboring Kashmir. Prime Minister Mohammed Ali, who heard crowds Tuesday night shouting for "War with India," held his third emergency cabinet meeting in three days. He and his ministers discussed the "serious repercussions" felt in Pakistan over the replacement of the arrested Sheikh Abdullah by pro-Indian Bakshi Ghulam Mohammed. New Delhi. It was authoritatively reported that Mohammed Ali may go to the Indian capital today to discuss the crisis with Prime Minister Nehru.

Egypt In Trade Deal With Russia

CAIRO, (Reuters)—An Egyptian spokesman said Wednesday his government has approved a trade and payment agreement with Russia. The agreement calls for Egypt to supply cotton in exchange for Soviet wheat, lumber and chemical products. It is expected to be signed here next week.

Three More Air Squadrons To Move Overseas

OTTAWA, (CP)—The last three squadrons of Canada's 12-squadron Sabre jet air division for the North Atlantic Treaty Organization will begin moving from Canada to their base at Baden-Soellingen, Germany, Aug. 27, weather permitting. Arrival of the three squadrons, which make up the fourth wing of the fighter air division, will complete Canada's air commitment to NATO forces in Europe well ahead of schedule. Two wings, each consisting of three squadrons of Sabre jets, already are stationed on the continent and another is slated to move from England to Europe next year.

Churchill Pays Visit To 10 Downing Street

LONDON, (Reuters)—Sir Winston Churchill, with cigar in mouth and implish smile, dropped into his 10 Downing street residence in London Wednesday for the first time since illness put him out of action June 27. He spent 2 1/2 hours there in conference with the acting foreign secretary, the Marquess of Salisbury, before driving on to his private country home in Chartwell, Kent. The prime minister is expected to return to Chequers, his official country residence, in about two weeks. Churchill chose the hottest day of the year for his trip to London. He walked firmly and showed no signs of strain which incapacitated him after his intensive coronation schedule and leadership of the Commonwealth conference. Hundreds of Londoners and tourists stood gazing as Churchill stepped from his limousine, dressed in a light pin-stripe suit, grey hat and gloves and polka-dot tie, and carrying a walking stick.

Soviet Air Force Quits Four Bases In East Germany

BERLIN, (AP)—The Soviet Air Force has evacuated four important air bases in East Germany. It was confirmed Wednesday. Allied officers are temporarily baffled at how to analyze the move. Carried out with startling speed, the withdrawal stripped Soviet airmen and warplanes from fields at Wuernneuchen, Neuperschain, Finsterwalde and Brand. The Werneuchen base, 10 miles east of Berlin, has been largely dismantled. Installations, including reserve fuel tanks, have been shipped off by freight trains in the direction of the Soviet Union, German underground informants disclosed.

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Heavy Destruction On Greek Islands; 400 Dead, 3,000 Homeless

ATHENS, (Reuters)—Mount Aenos on the quake-shattered island of Cephalonia was seen splitting in two Wednesday night as earth tremors continued to rumble through the Ionian isles off Greece's west coast. A gigantic fissure appeared in the crown of the 5,341-foot mountain which towers over hilly Cephalonia, one of the worst hit islands in the quake area. Tremors continued to rock the islands. Tidal waves washed over coastal areas and fires broke out in devastated towns.

Airman Is Named Attache To Belgium

OTTAWA, (CP)—Wing Cmdr. E. L. Vurtele, 39, of Saint John, N.B., and Montreal has been appointed Canadian naval, military and air attache to Belgium and air attache to Norway and Denmark. The RCAF announced Wednesday. Educated in Montreal, he joined the RAF in 1936 coming to Canada in 1943 as chief instructor at Patricia Bay on Vancouver Island. He transferred to the RCAF staff college at Toronto in 1948. He served two years as RCAF liaison officer in Newfoundland when that province entered Confederation. No successor was named to his post as commanding officer of the RCAF station at Toronto.

SEARCH ABANDONED

SOUTH RUISLIP, England, (CP)—The U. S. air force said Tuesday the search for survivors of the RB-36 which crashed in the Atlantic last Wednesday has been abandoned. Four men were rescued, five bodies were recovered, and 14 men were presumed lost.

Towns Destroyed

The two big towns which the prefect of Cephalonia said were "completely destroyed" were Argostoli pop. 8,293, the chief town, and Lixouri pop. 4,843, the second town. They are situated on the southwest coast of the island, which has a total population of about 67,000 and covers 277 mountainous square miles ringed by a rugged coastline.

As he emerged from the talks inside a crowd of 400 surged forward. Police threw a hasty gordon around his car. The prime minister grinned at photographers and asked: "How am I going to get to my car?" As the crowd made way for him, Rufus, his chocolate-colored poodle which had been separated from him during the illness, bounded forward and shot inside the car to be sure of a ride to Chartwell this time. Churchill waved at the crowd seized Rufus' paw. Shouts of "glad from inside the car and playfully to see you better" followed the disappearing car. Churchill's unexpected call at Downing street was regarded by officials as fresh evidence of his intention to resume his full duties as soon as possible. He has not released his grip on foreign affairs during his illness. There is no need for the premier to be in London now since Parliament is in recess. No cabinet meeting is scheduled until the end of this month.

HALIFAX, (CP)—The Weather Office says temperature over northern New Brunswick rose to the upper 80's Wednesday. In the southern Maritimes it was warm and humid with temperatures in the 70's and low 80's.

Coastal fog moved inland Wednesday night along the south coast of Nova Scotia and fog patches were expected to form near dawn over the remainder of the district.

A band of showers is forecast to reach eastern Quebec and northwestern N. E. w. Brunswick Thursday evening, but otherwise fine, sunny weather is forecast for all the district Thursday.
