THE annual concert in aid of the new Roman Catholic Cathedral is destined this year to eclipse all former ones. The new hall in the basement is now gorgeously decorated for the occasion. An elaborate stage has just been completed under the superintendence of Mr. May, whose well known ability is sufficient guarantee of the excellence of the work. On both sides of the stage commodious dressing rooms have been curtained off. Along the front of the stage is strung suspended from the ceiling a code of flags, which under the mellow influence of the incandescent light create a pretty effect. Directly above the middle of the stage may be seen the Papal Flag, and emerging behind it on the right appears the Union Jack, while on the left the American flag displays its starry folds. A beautiful drapery covers the pillars and falls in majestic folds between them the whole presenting a magnificent effect. A choice programme of vocal and instrumental music has been prepared, and no doubt it will be artistically rendered.

BOARD OF TRADE.

The quarterly meeting of the Charlottetown Board of Trade was held last evening, President Hazard in the chair. After the reading of the minutes and correspondence, the following resolutions were passed.

1. That in the opinion of this Board it would be well that the boilers of the ferry boats be regularly inspected by the officials appointed by the Dominion government for that purpose.

(2) That this Board petition the Minister of Railways in regard to the through railway fares in force during the summer season between Charlottetown, St. John and Boston, with a view to placing this province on an equality with St. John and Halifax, also to supply clean and good cars between Pt. Du Chene and Paines Junction and between Picton and Stellarton Junction.

(3.) That the Board desires to impress upon the Provincial Government the desirability of contributing towards the construction of a bridge across the Hillsborough River, in conjunction with the Dominion government, for railway, vehicle and passenger traffic, and that a sufficient sum be placed in the estimates this session for the purpose.

Mr. George Carter brought up the matter of the adoption by Canada of the British system of parcels post; Mr. MacKinnon introduced the subject of the collection of vital statistics; and Mr. George Auld referred to the desirability of having the Stanley leave Picton in the morning instead of in the afternoon.

It was understood that the latter subject should be dealt with by the Council; consideration of other matters was postponed.

CITY COUNCIL INVADERS.—A Chattanooga, Tenn., despatch says: One hundred of the religious women of Chattanooga sang hymns in the City Council Chamber last night, during a meeting of the aldermanic board. As the result of a recent revival meeting the Council, through the influence of the temperance element, passed an ordinance, requiring the saloons to close between ten o'clock at night and five o'clock in the morning. There has been great pressure upon the aldermen to amend the ordinance, fixing the closing hour at midnight, and it was reported that the ordinance would be amended last night. While the meeting was being held the women filed in. One was given the privilege of the floor, and made an appeal that the ordinance be not amended. After her address the further "indulgence" of the Council was asked, and the women then sang "Stand Up for Jesus," "Rock of Ages" and other songs. The aldermen seemed impressed, and the motion to amend the ordinance was not made.
