## Tomorrow Is Aquatic Day, West Prince B. Of T. Busy

The Aquatic day Committee of the West Prince Board of Trade was busy engaged Monday with final preparations for the biggest day of water sports ever staged in this part of the Province. For some weeks plans and preparations have been going forward under the chairmanship of Earle Atkinson of Alberton.

A large banner at the intersection of Main and Church Streets in Alberton attracts the attention of all who enter the town and markers leading eastward on Church Street point the way to Kildare Bridge (known locally as Gillian's Bridge) where Aquatic Sports Day will be held Wednesday afternoon, August 1st.

Premier A. W. Matheson has been invited to conduct the official opening at 1:30 p.m. Other speakers who have been invited to attend include Mrs. Harry Cutmore, Director of Red Cross Swimming and Water Safety for the Province; Prigadier W. W. Reid, Director of the Physical Fitness program; Fred Ramsay, M. L. A.; and presidents of the Charlottetown and Summerside Boards of Trade. R. D. McKinnon of Alberton will be master of ceremonies.

Another feature attraction is the long distance three-mile swim open to residents of Prince Edward Island. Following the official opening and introduction of the contestants, those who are to participate in this three-mile swim will be transported to Montrose Bridge where they will enter the water and proceed toward Killare Bridge. While this swim is in progress other events will proceed at Kildare Bridge.

A half-mile swim open to non-residents of the Province will be of interest to tourists. Three classes of boat races are scheduled in addition to the swimming events.

Meals will be served at Kildare Bridge and there will be booths at which hot dogs, soft drinks and ice cream will be available. There will also be swings for the children and a country store.

Much thought, planning and work have been given by the committee to West Prince's first annual Aquatic Sports Day and the event is anticipated with enthusiasm by all who are interested in water sports.

## Death In Malden Of Mrs. G. Campbell

Mrs. Garnet Campbell, for many years a resident of Graham's Road, passed away at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Arthur Linell in Malden, Mass., on July 20, 1956. The former Miss Charlotte Warren was born at New London seventy-three years ago. All of her married life was spent at Graham's Road with the exception of a few years in New Glasgow, N.S. On Saturday August 4th a handicap race for the B. A. Atkinson trophy will be held at West Point for the first time in eighteen years. Open to fishermen from Cape Egmont to Campbellton the race was first held on Dominion Day 1910 but has not been run off since 1939 when it was won by Russell MacLean. At the time the winner of the handicap was presented with a flag until the presentation of a beautiful silver cup by the late Mrs. B. A. Atkinson, the former Isabel Milligen of Brae, P. E. I.

Rules for the contest were drawn up by the donor and the winning boat is not necessarily the fastest in the race.

There will also be a free-for-all and other races. The trophy is now on display at Matheson's Drug Store, O'Leary.
