Household Hints.

Sure Cure for Chronic Diarrhoea.—Orange-peel tea, sweetened with loaf sugar, used for common drink twenty-four or thirty-six hours.

To Cure Chapped Hands.—Instead of washing the hands with soap, employ oatmeal, and, after each washing, take a little dry meal, and rub over the hands, so as to absorb any moisture.

To Stop Nose-Bleeding.—Press the lip tightly to the jaw with the thumb, held firmly just under and to the right (or left) of the nostril. A branch of the facial artery may be felt in this locality, on either side; and, when the circulation is arrested, the bleeding in the nose stops.

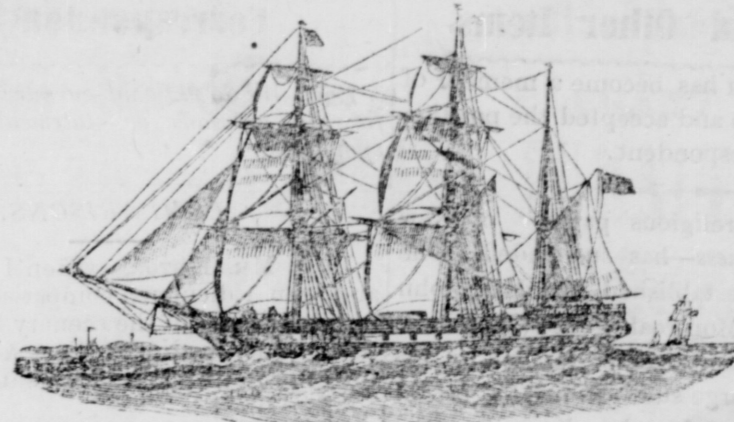
