

# Ireland To Commemorate Men Who Died In Uprising

DUBLIN (CP) — Ireland, a land that loves its martyrs, will be plunged into a marathon commemoration next week for the men who died in the Easter Rising of 1916, the bloody threshold to Irish independence. But true to the troubled history of Ireland's 44 years of self-rule, nostalgia is not the only mood of this emotional anniversary. The possibility of violence from embittered extremists of the outlawed Irish Republican Army hangs over the week-long round of parades,

wreath placings and church services scheduled to start Easter Sunday. All police leave has been cancelled over the holiday weekend and the army placed on 24-hour alert. Patrols along the border with Northern Ireland are likely to increase their vigilance, though there is no official word of special measures. Irish authorities, while playing down any suggestion of tension, are far better prepared for potential trouble from their own diehard rebels than the British were that sunny Monday 50 years ago when the green-uniformed citizen soldiers led by Padriac Pearse struck their courageous but abortive blow for freedom.

Undermanned and pathetically ill-equipped a total of some 1,600 Irish forces managed to hold out against 20,000 British troops for a week of bitter fighting, in which most of central Dublin was reduced to smoking ruins.

# New Refrigeration Methods Will Be Tested By Dragger

OTTAWA (CP) — A federal boat has left Nova Scotia for the Carolina scallop grounds to test new refrigeration methods. Fisheries Minister Robichaud told the Commons.

He was replying to Lloyd R. Crouse (PC — Queens — Lunenburg), who voiced the concern of fishermen about recent inspection practices and the seizure of large quantities of the shellfish.

Mr. Robichaud said department inspectors have a duty to perform and it is the responsibility of fishermen and producers to co-operate. There had been no change in policy on scallops.

But fishermen had to recognize the scallops caught in the warm waters of the Carolinas needed more care than those taken in the icy seas of George's Bank off Canada's East Coast.

Mr. Crouse suggested department officials spend more time teaching fishermen to ice their

catch correctly and helping them market it. **TAKE HEAVY CATCHES**  
The Nova Scotia member said later in an interview that south shore boats have been taking heavy catches from extensive scallop beds off the Carolinas, a three-day voyage from Nova Scotia.

Large surplus stocks had been built up as a result and the price to fishermen had dropped. Mr. Crouse said the warmer waters and the long voyage from the Carolinas posed another problem. Unless care was taken, the quality of the catch was reduced.

As a result, the fisheries department was planning experiments in chilling holds with salt water.

The MP said he'd like to see a "national scallop week" proclaimed to cut surplus stock and help boost prices in the industry.

## Coal-Wash Plant Will Be Re-Built

MINTO, N.B. (CP) — A coal-washing plant destroyed by fire near here recently will resume operations in three to six months.

A spokesman for D.W. and R. A. Mills Ltd. said here that layoffs were planned and workers employed at the washing plant would be engaged on other work until a new plant begins operations.

Damage was estimated at \$750,000 in the fire.

## Both Sides Far Apart In Viet Nam

UNITED NATIONS (CP) — United Nations Secretary-General U. Thant said here he sees no "immediate reconciliation" in the Vietnamese conflict because both sides are as far apart as ever.

He told a press conference there can be no solution to the conflict until the points of view of each side could be clearly defined, thus opening a possible avenue leading towards peace talks.

Thant said that the only solution to the crisis would be the establishment of Viet Nam as an "independent and non-aligned country," adding that this would mean a unified North and South Viet Nam as called for in the Geneva agreements in 1954.

The secretary-general again ruled out the UN's 15-nation Security Council as an instrument in bringing peace to Viet Nam, pointing out that the United States is the only nation involved in the dispute that is a member of the world organization.

One letter simply stands for another. In this sample A is used for the three L's, X for the two O's, etc. Single letters, apostrophes, the length and formation of the words are all hints. Each day the code letters are different.
