Carloadings

OTTAWA, Oct. 27—(CP)—Carloadings on Canadian railways during the week ended Oct. 21 climbed to a seasonal peak at 92,733 cars, compared with 81,211 cars the previous week, and 86,769 cars for the corresponding week a year ago. The Bureau of Statistics reported today that increased loadings over the similar period last year were shown in grain, ores, building products, pulpwood, lumber, gasoline and woodpulp and paper. Principal reductions were registered in loadings of livestock and coal.
