## Cerebral Palsy Conference Said Uniquely For Families

The fifth annual conference on Cerebral Palsy, scheduled in Centre, Charlottetown, Dr. Robert Forsythe, superintendent of Charlottetown June 4-6, will have as its guest speaker Dr. S. J. of the Mental Health division, Koezler, clinical director of the MacDonald, director of Charlottetown's sheltered workshop.

The conference is unlike other CP conferences now being held in other parts of Canada, officials stress, in that the discussions are designed to encourage participation by parents and families of cerebral palsy victims, not just doctors and specialists.

Conference chairman, Brigadier M.W. Reid, of Charlottetown, deputy minister of welfare, said the conference theme of "Parental Responsibility in Cerebral Palsy Programs," is designed to impart as much information and encouragement as possible to Atlantic Area families as possible.

## Resisting Fisheries Officer Costs Montrose Man \$200

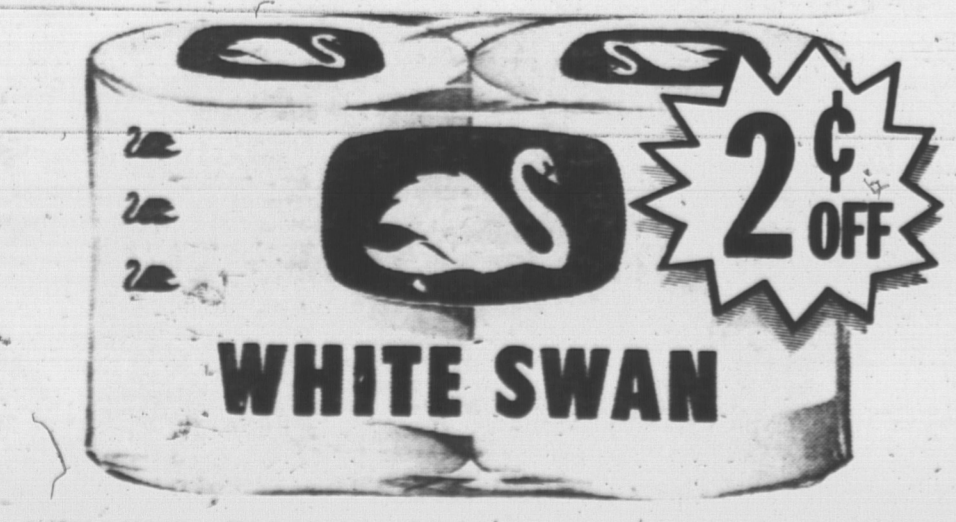
