**From Yesterday's 5 o'clock Edition.**

WASHINGTON, May 13.—The set back received by American blockading squadron in the engagement in Cardenas harbor on Wednesday and the loss of five lives on board the torpedo boat Winslow had a sobering effect on the element in the navy which is crying out for rapid action, and efforts at destroying batteries with unarmoured ships.

There will probably be an inquiry instituted to ascertain the responsibility for sending such unprotected shells as the Winslow against fortified parts.

NEW YORK, May 13.—In the bombardment of San Juan, a seaman on the New York was instantly killed and four on the Indiana were injured.

The Spanish guns were inefficient and their artillery men helpless. The troops fled in dismay, and as they fled through the streets the Governor-General of the Island refused to accompany them declaring he would hold the town himself. His beautiful daughter also declined to leave the city and stood in the street imploring the soldiers return to the forts and fight the Yankees.

Neither the Governor nor his daughter lost their courage when a shell took off the roof of the Governor's Palace.

PORT AU PRINCE, May 13.—The American fleet under Rear Admiral Sampson bombarded San Juan De Porto Rico, yesterday.

The following are the details of the bombardment thus far received: Rear Admiral Sampson with nine warships arrived before San Juan just about sunrise. At the signal the battleship Iowa fired the first shot, which took effect.

Then the battleship Indiana opened fire and in a few minutes Morro Fort was reduced to a heap of ruins.

The fort made little effort to respond and was silenced almost immediately.

The Spanish steamer Rita was captured by the United States auxiliary cruiser Yale which took her crew on board.

LONDON, May 13.—The Hong Kong correspondence of The Daily Mail says that the Spaniards at Manila are incensed against the British because it is believed the Esmeralda piloted the Americans into the Bay.

It is feared that the Spanish soldiers who are unpaid will attack the British factories.

The British gun boat Linnet brought from Manila both the Spanish and American mails.

WASHINGTON, May 13.—The following despatch came to Sec'y Long late yesterday afternoon, and shows that cable communication has been reported with Manila Bay:

"HONG KONG, May 12.—To the Sec'y of the Navy Department,—

"There is little change in the situation since my last telegram. I am transferring to transports, steel breech loading rifles from the sunken Spanish men-of-war, also stores from the arsenal in my possession. I am maintaining a strict blockade. Add Argus to list of destroyed vessels.

NEW YORK, May 13.—A special cable to the World from Neuvas, Cuba, says chaos reigns at Camaguey and fear and famine at Neuvitas.

Every boat in this harbor, steam and sail, has been jammed into the narrow channel to be sunk at the first sign of attack.

Two thousand soldiers guard the entrance, twelve miles from the city and four old cannon have been mounted on an island in the harbor.

People are starving. Salt pork costs a dollar and a half per pound, rice fifty cents and goats bring one hundred dollars each.

The Spanish Commander told the starving citizens to go into the country as he could not feed them. Many soldiers are joining the insurgents to get food. The condition at Puerto Principe is still worse.

The surrounding forts are almost abandoned and the Spanish columns on the way to the coast are burning all the country homes.

WASHINGTON, May 13.—The Spanish Squadron has been sighted to the westward of Martinique, 200 miles from San Juan.

Upon receipt of this information Commodore Schley's flying squadron was ordered to put to sea at once. It is believed he will engage the Spanish squadron at St. Thomas, West Indies.

WASHINGTON, May 13.—Plans for the immediate invasion of Cuba are materially changed by the news of the presence of the Spanish fleet in West India water.

Sampson's fleet is now outside San Juan awaiting the coming Spanish fleet.

**What About the Philippines?**

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 12.—Keenly alive to the possibility of the United States transferring the Philippines to another power, Europe is watching with intense interest the policy of this country with respect to their ultimate destination. It can be stated on high diplomatic authority that rather than the Philippines should become the possession of any other nation, or vided they cannot be returned to Spain. Europe, as a whole, prefers that they should remain the property of the United States Government. In view of the absolute neutrality observed by Great Britain, it is stated in the Herald, diplomats here regard it as practically impossible for the great powers to reach an agreement for the exertion of pressure on the Washington Government, as a result of which it will withdraw from the islands. Such being the case, Europe desires that the United States flag shall continue to wave over the land which Rear Admiral Dewey has conquered.

**Russian Tyranny**

PEKIN, May 11.—The Russian consul at Tien Tsu has notified his colleagues that foreigners will not be allowed at Port Arthur or at Talien Wan without pass ports revised by him. Both Chinese and foreigners bitterly complain of this, inasmuch as the Tsung-Li-Yamen expressly instructed their officials that both ports were to be treated as treaty ports.



More Vessels.  
Washington, May 12.—Profiting by the necessities of the present, the department has practically determined to build what may be termed de-trover's of top do boat destroyers. Formidable boats of this type will be constructed under the specifications which are being prepared by the naval board of bureau chiefs. The displacement of the boats is fixed at about 600 tons each. Light steel will be the structural material employed. Two quadruple expansion engines, capable of developing from 10,500 to 11,000 indicated horse power, will cause the twin screws of each boat to revolve at a rate sufficient to drive it at a speed of 23 knots per hour. The engines and boiler are to be placed in separate compartments, so as to diminish the chance of disablement by one shot.
